A MESSAGE FROM RABBI JAY ROSENBAUM

Dear Friends,

There is a concept in Musar (Jewish ethical self-help) called *bechirah points*. Bechirah means choice. A bechirah point is the point at which a choice becomes a moral struggle. It's different for each of us and it changes as we change.

For a person who grew up in a nice neighborhood, robbing a bank is not a serious temptation. But, being totally honest on an income tax form might require some emotional effort. If we are that person the goal of teshuvah (moral selfreflection) is to get so good at making the ethical choice that is challenging for us that it becomes a habit, no more a real choice than our 'decision' not to rob banks. When that happens, we move on to a new bechirah point, and the struggle renews.

What are our bechirah points? What are the wrong choices we struggle not to make? What are the right choices that don't come easily to us? Identifying our moral gray areas is the first step towards making the High Holidays a meaningful time of personal growth.

So good luck with your bechirah points! And, may God inscribe each of us for a happy, healthy and sweet New Year.

Use them in your family sukkah, then bring them to shul and participate in the hoshanot ritual. S'chach, the greenery to adorn your sukkah, will be available in 25 lb. bundles. A Sukkah Kit includes everything to build a sukkah but the s'chach. In order to receive lulav, etrog, s'chach or sukkah kit, you must pre-order by September 2. This special program, featuring a discussion led by Rabbi Rosenbaum, is a great introduction to the spiritual work we all need to do to prepare for the High Holidays.

Frequently Asked Questions: Parking & Transportation

Who may park in the synagogue parking lot?

You may park in the synagogue parking lot if you are a Platinum, Gold or Silver level member with a parking placard.

If I have a state disabled permit or must be dropped close to the door, what can I do?

Proceed into the main parking lot and use the Valet Parking service, available beginning 45 minutes before each service. No Valet for 6:00 PM Mincha on Rosh Hashanah Day 1, Monday, September 10 (lot open to all for that service only). Due to space limitations, there is no self parking for disabled permits. **No advance arrangements are necessary.**

Where do I park if I don't have a state disabled permit but I can't manage the walk from off-site parking?

Use our courtesy shuttle service from the Mercerwood Shore Club parking lot (4150 E Mercer Way). Marked shuttles will be running during the hours listed below. If you need further assistance, contact Melanie at 206-232-8555 x200.

If I don't have a special need, where can I park?

ONLY these areas have been authorized:

• The SJCC parking lot (except where marked "No Parking 24/7")

• Mercerwood Shore Club, 4150 E Mercer Way (except "No Parking" area) Please do not park anywhere that states "NO HNT Parking" as a courtesy to our neighbors as well as being mindful about parking in fire lanes or blocking driveways. If you park in any undesignated area you risk being towed at your own expense by the city. *The boat launch is not available for parking*. We encourage you to carpool and use our shuttle service.



Frequently Asked Questions:

How do I include my guests in the services?

Go to **h-nt.org/hh** and fill out the form or call the office at 206-232-8555 with their contact information so we can send them an information packet. Due to enhanced security measures each adult attendee is asked to bring the information packet to services.

Is there a cost for guests attending our services?

If you are a Platinum, Gold, Silver or Bronze level member we will not be suggesting a donation of your guests. To help defray costs, others will be asked if they wish to make a suggested donation of \$180 per person for each of the two holidays.

How can I reserve a seat (designated by a blue slipcover)?

If you:

- Are a Platinum or Gold Member (call the office to become either)
- Have a nameplate on a seat
- Use a wheelchair*
- Are unable to climb steps or maneuver the aisle*

* You may reserve seats by calling Melanie at 206-232-8555 x200. Seats will be presumed unused two hours after the start of services, and released for general seating unless prior arrangements have been made. These seats may be held longer for health reasons if prior arrangements are made by calling the synagogue office.

For whom is Yizkor (the Memorial Service) recited?

Yizkor may be said for all deceased loved ones, parents, grandparents, other family and friends. Though some follow the tradition of leaving during the Yizkor service if their immediate family members are still alive, all are encouraged to stay.



Frequently Asked Questions

Will there be enough High Holiday Mahzorim (prayer books) for each congregant?

Thanks to the generous grant from the Goldstein Family Foundation, we have 500 volumes available for use on a first come, first serve basis in the upper & lower foyers. You are encouraged to purchase a personal copy of Mahzor Lev Shalem from the front office for \$35 in advance of the holiday.

Can I use the telephone?

Except in emergencies, telephone use is prohibited on Shabbat and holidays. For those who must carry cell phones, please set them to silent. If there is a 911 level emergency, see the security officer at any exit. There are also phones throughout the building for emergencies only.

Fragrance-Free

Please refrain from using fragrances (perfumes, colognes, etc.), as there are members who are highly allergic to these substances. Gum chewing is also inappropriate in the worship spaces.

In Case of Emergency

Notify an usher, a security officer or staff member. Telephones for emergency use are located in most rooms. First Aid kits are in the main office and kitchen at HNT. AEDs are located on the upper level across from the women's restroom and in the lower foyer next to the sanctuary door.
