A Message from Rabbi Jacob Herber

Write these words during a time when the novel Coronavirus has infected over 5 million in the United States, killed over 160,000 Americans, and devasted our economy. Our national COVID-19 curve has not flattened, but pointed upward. We face profound crisis and uncertainty. As the Prophet Amos stated: "I am not a prophet nor am I the son of a prophet" so I can't predict what the situation will be a number of weeks after I write this bulletin article and you receive it.

I am, however, sure of the fact that while temporal events change from moment-to-moment, eternal values never change. The period of the High Holy Days is about eternal values and though events change in the world at-large, we change as we grow older, and those around us change as they do the same, the lessons of Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur continue to bring us eternal verities that enlighten our lives and brighten our souls.

Perhaps the best example of those eternal lessons is

mentioned in the Musaf service. In the prayer "Untaneh Tokef" we are reminded that "T'shuvah, Tefillah, and Tzedakah have the power to transform the harshness of our destiny." T'shuvah is translated as "repentance" and it reminds us that we can all change. Each of us has the ability to grow, mature, and become better people. Our conduct is not pre-destined because we have free will and we can use it for good or for ill. In his Rosh Hashanah mahzor, Rabbi Jonathan Sacks recounts the following story: Once, shortly before Rosh Hashana, an itinerant shoemaker passed the house of Rabbi Levi Yitzhak of Berditchev, crying, "Anything to mend?" When he heard these words the rabbi wept, saying, "Alas, for my soul, for the Day of Judgment is almost at hand, and I have not yet mended myself."

T'shuvah allows us the opportunity to look upon our lives and become better people. It reminds us that what has been in the past doesn't have to dictate the future. We can make amends for our mistakes. This is an eternal Jewish value and the High Holy Days challenge us to live up to its ideal.

Tefillah is translated as "prayer." Prayer isn't an easy activity for any of us. It requires fluency of language and emotion of the soul. It forces us to recognize that there is a power greater than us and that not everything is in our control. Ultimately, it's the language of faith that would have us understand that when we pray, we hope that God listens to our words as God searches our souls.

Rabbi Sacks again brings us a significant story: Rabbi Nahman of Kosov taught that we should always have God in our thoughts. "But how?" asked a disciple, "can we think of God while we are engaged in business?" The rabbi replied, "If we think of business when we are praying, then we can think of praying when we are doing business."

Prayer should allow us to recognize that the values of our tradition, its morals and ethical teachings, must always be part of our lives. There is nothing that we do, no person with whom we interact, no daily activity that we perform that doesn't allow us the opportunity of living by the high aspirations of our tradition's values, morals, and ethics. Prayer challenges us to recognize those values, to live by them, and, yet, still leave a little left to faith.

The third aspect of this statement, Tzedakah is usually translated as "charity." But a more precise translation would be "righteousness."

We have a responsibility to do what is right and proper, and not to simply give out of caritas, love. Yet again Rabbi Sacks offers a meaningful story: The 15th century Jewish diplomat and scholar, Don Isaac Abarbanel, was once asked by King Ferdinand how much he owned. He named a certain sum. "But surely," the king said, "you own much more than that." "You asked me," Abarbanel replied, "how much I owned. The property I have, I do not own. Your majesty may seize it from me tomorrow. At best I am its temporary guardian. The sum I mentioned is what I have given away in charity. That merit alone, neither you nor any earthly power can take away from me."

We have a, obligation to give of ourselves and our financial means to those in need. We have an obligation to aid those less fortunate than we are and to help them. So many of us are suffering right now. Some have been furloughed, others have lost their jobs or their businesses. We bear the responsibility for assisting our friend and the stranger, for our local community and for those throughout our country and around the world. Abarbanel teaches us we own what we are willing to share.

I can't predict the future. I have no idea when a vaccine will be developed or when this pandemic will eventually end. I don't know what our post-Covid world will look like. Believe me, I wish I could. But I can suggest that if we live by the eternal values enumerated in the "Untaneh Tokef" we will be better people, and the world will be a better place in which to live.

May the New Year of 5781 be one of good health and wellness and true peace for you, your loved ones, our country, and the world.

Message from the President

¬ raditionally September is a month of new beginnings. L Summer turns to fall, our children enter new classrooms as they advance a grade, and we as a community join together in the expanded sanctuary/Feinberg Social Hall of HNT to observe the High Holidays. This year our children are still beginning a new school year, and the High Holidays are just around the corner, but these activities are all happening from within our homes. For some of us that is comforting. In addition to staying safe and healthy, it means a more relaxed atmosphere where we're freed from traffic, parking, and high heels. For others, it's more difficult. We're feeling isolated in our homes and struggle to differentiate the High Holidays from every other day of the last five months. There are things we can do to make these distinctions. For the past several months I've been "commuting" to my home office. In the morning I walk a loop around my neighborhood before I begin my workday and, in the afternoon, I walk the same loop in the opposite direction to get "home." This routine has been good for me physically and mentally, and it allows me to end my workday which could so easily bleed into the evening. I'm not sure that I'll "commute" to High Holidays services, but I do plan to create a sacred space in my home. For High Holiday services, I will silence the ringer on my phone, I will dress up (at least a bit), and my family will sit together (I hope) in a room which we do not use for work or school. This year's services will not look like those we've experienced in the past, and while I will not be able to see all of you as I usually do, I am comforted by the knowledge that you are experiencing services virtually alongside me, as are Jews throughout the world.

I can't properly thank everyone who has contributed to this year's High Holiday programming, but I'd like to recognize just a few of the people who have gone above and beyond. Tara Reck co-chaired the High Holiday Task Force with Rabbi Herber (who began this work ahead of arriving in Seattle and officially beginning in his role). Audrey Covner and Herb Weisbaum worked together to provide the technology and produce a visual experience that will surely enhance our holidays. Rabbi Herber, Cantor Kurland, and Dr. Eliyahu Krigel have worked together to create services and programs that will be meaningful during these difficult times. And of course, nothing happens at HNT without Nadine Strauss and her dedicated staff.

hen we take sides on important issues and causes, we stand up for what we believe to be true and just. Elie Wiesel's powerful reminder in the quote above can serve as a catalyst for growth and development. Learning about the Holocaust is a sensitive subject we take very seriously in our school community. At FRS we teach about the Holocaust in 5th grade in a thoughtful and age-appropriate way. Our Holocaust Educator Nicole Elbling works collaboratively with our 5th grade teacher Morah Andi Neuwirth to reach each student where they are at by encouraging questions and meaningful conversation about this tragic and dark time in our collective history.

The goal of the Holocaust education program at FRS is to teach students a basic understanding of what happened during this challenging and terrible time in Jewish history. Students will also work to learn modern day lessons from the events of the Holocaust, helping them to realize the importance of being "upstanders:" people who identify injustice and choose to take positive action to help others.
