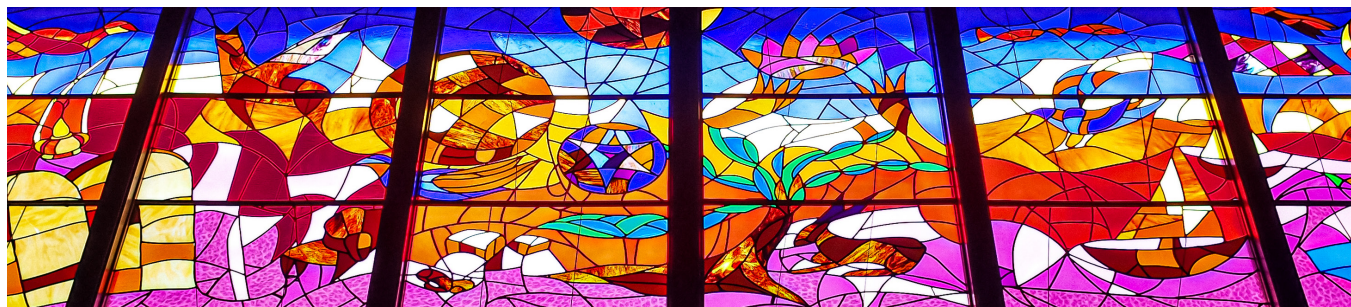

A Message from Rabbi Jacob Herber



By the time the High Holy Day season ends there is a bit of a letdown. The holidays, complete with synagogue worship – this year experienced via online streaming - as well as home rituals, bring a sense of intense spirituality. We anticipate the High Holy Days with great excitement and anxiety, and we look forward to the beautiful festival of Sukkot and to its conclusion with Simhat Torah. However, once the holidays are concluded, there is a long gap until the next major festival, which is Passover. At least we have a few stops in between with Hanukkah, Tu B'Shvat, and Purim.

The challenge we have is to create those moments of spirituality and community during the rest of the year, a challenge made even more acute by the novel Coronavirus. The remainder of the year does, indeed, offer us many opportunities for synagogue involvement, community volunteer opportunities, and intellectual growth.

Dr. Ron Wolfson, a well-known and respected thought-leader of the Conservative Movement and a professor at the American Jewish University in Los Angeles, suggests in his book, *Relational Judaism: Using the Power of Relationships to Transform the Jewish Community* that the goal of synagogue life is to allow its members to become a Relational Jew, a Jew who views Judaism as impacting virtually all of one's relationships. He claims that

there are indicators of Jewish identification and internal Jewish identity which are shaped by the relationships of life:

“ Do I see myself as Jewish? Does my Jewishness influence the way I live my life: my work, my purpose, my hobbies, my indulgences, the food I eat, the music I listen to?

Do I see myself as part of a Jewish family? How do I relate to being a Jewish father, daughter, grandfather, sister, partner, spouse?
Do I locate myself among a network of good friends, friends who will be there for me in good times and bad?

Do I engage in lifelong learning about Judaism? Do I try on Jewish practice? Do I commit to living a Jewish life? Does Jewish observance shape the way I live: the rhythm of my week, the calendar of my year?

Do I support the community, a synagogue, JCC, Federation, Jewish defense organization?

Do I connect to the Jewish people, the “tribe”?

Do I care about the State of Israel?

Do I work to repair the world? Do I wrestle with God?”

These questions should inspire us after the High Holy Day season to get involved in our synagogue and community programs. I encourage you to join our daily Zoom morning minyan. I hope you will make time for our festival and our Shabbat services

– Friday night and Shabbat morning – and join with our synagogue community in celebrating the sanctity of Jewish sacred time. At a time when so many of us are feeling physically distant from others and isolated, these online gatherings can provide us with important moments of connection.

I hope you will put aside time for growth in your Jewish learning, joining me and others for online educational offerings. All of us, at whatever level we find ourselves in our Jewish knowledge, can always grow. And I hope you will get involved with our Social Action Committee. I recently met with Michael Adler and Mindy Landsman, the chairs of our Social Action Committee. They would love to have you join them. Get involved and participate in their holy and noble work!

If you think about it, there is no reason that after the High Holy Day season there should be a lull in the time that we spend with the synagogue or with Jewish life and rituals. In fact, the holiday season should be a catalyst for us to become more involved, more informed, and better Relational Jews in the months to come.

I hope to see you on my computer screen and, hopefully soon, in-person, throughout the course of 5781.

Virtual High Holy Day Services: How We Did It

It had never been done before – virtual High Holiday services, but the COVID-19 pandemic left us no other option.

When I was asked to install video equipment in the sanctuary (made possible by a generous donation from Audrey Covner and Dianne Dougherty) and produce the streaming broadcasts, I knew we had to find a way to provide content that would be meaningful and engaging for congregants watching at home. Hopefully, we were successful in that goal.

Here's what we did. We installed three high-quality (4K) digital cameras – one on Rabbi Herber, one on Cantor Kurland, and a third mounted on a pillar at the side of the sanctuary. Because it can tilt, pan and zoom this "skycam" enabled us to get various shots of the bimah.

The control room for switching all the video sources (taped and live) was set up at the top of the sanctuary.

While much of the davening was done live, we had to pre-record some parts of the service in order to keep congregants safe – a top priority in all of this. Each person associated with the Torah service came in separately. After they did their part, we disinfected the Cantor's lectern and the Torah handles. The Shofar blowing had to be done outside. All told, it took five days to record all of this and another couple of days to edit it.

While this was a rewarding experience for all involved, we hope we can all gather together again in the shul early in 2021.

A Dvar

"Leadership begins with taking responsibility. At the heart of Judaism are three beliefs about leadership: We are free. We are responsible. And together we can change the world." -Rabbi Jonathan Sachs

As we all continue to transition to a new way of life in the age of Covid-19, the quote above from Rabbi Sachs is a helpful reminder of the origins of leadership. By first taking responsibility, leaders demonstrate their values by behaving in a directed way. Students at FRS have shown their leadership this year by connecting through a virtual space on a consistent basis with their class and teacher to continue their journey of learning. This past summer we held the sixth annual Becoming a Leader program via Zoom where high school students demonstrated what good leadership looks like. The first Becoming a Leader Program at HNT was in 2015. Instead of skipping the program altogether because of the coronavirus, we went virtual. Nothing can stop us from connecting and learning.

During the virtual program, 20 students had an incredibly powerful experience. We participated in a virtual escape room through Reality Break Escapes and learned about the seven principles of a good leader based on the teachings of Rabbi Sachs. Students also worked through a workbook called The 7 Habits of Highly Effective Teens Personal Workbook by Sean Covey. It's no surprise the first habit is to be proactive and take responsibility for your life. The high school students did an outstanding job taking responsibility and successfully leading the program which was geared towards middle school students. Rabbi Sarah Rensin joined me as the other virtual chaperone and our students connected, played Minecraft together, and learned despite our physical distance. We were thrilled to have Rabbi Herber join us to begin our program with inspirational words of leadership pointing us in the right direction.
