A Message from Rabbi Jacob Herber

If you've ever been in Israel in the Fall, just before the Days of Awe, you probably heard the phrase *Aharei HaHagim*, "after the holidays." Most people are frantically trying to prepare for these days because in Israel everything - schools, stores, offices - close for the holidays. So, this saying is freely used to let you that the person using it is going to be busy in the next few weeks. The shorthand is, you might as well wait for whatever product or service you're requesting. Here in the Diaspora we also need to acknowledge that as we come close to Rosh Hashanah, especially when it comes to the synagogue, where the High Holy Days are both extremely busy and take lots of time and effort, *Aharei HaHagim* is also a ubiquitous phrase.

For some people, indeed for most people, *Aharei HaHagim*, usually means after Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. These major holidays mark the high point of the synagogue ritual year. Once they're behind us most people return to their regular activities and pursuits. When it comes to the synagogue, however, and thankfully for many people at Herzl-Ner Tamid, *Aharei HaHagim* means after Simhat Torah. This shouldn't be surprising since the holiday of Sukkot, followed by Shemini Atzeret and Simhat

Torah, are highlights of the Jewish year and wonderful festivals in and of themselves.

When we finally have Simhat Torah in our rearview mirror, it's truly *Aharei HaHagim*. The fall holidays are over and it's time to move forward with the rest of the year. In our context that means that following the four weeks of fall festivals the regular activities of synagogue activities begin in earnest. The challenge for all of us is to continue the momentum of the High Holy Days and participate in synagogue programs and services with the same level of intensity throughout the course of the year.

As we reach that time known as *Aharei HaHagim* I hope you'll take advantage of the enriching religious services, volunteer opportunities, and educational offerings at HNT. And I'd like to personally invite you to join me for the courses I'll be offering this fall and winter. On Sunday mornings I'll be teaching Introduction to Judaism, which will cover everything from Jewish history to the Siddur and Jewish liturgy to the Tanakh (Bible), Shabbat and holidays, and everything in between. On alternating Wednesdays at noon I'll be offering my Lunch & Learn series which

will take a text-based approach to the exploring various aspects of Judaism. Finally, on alternating Wednesday evenings I'll be teaching the Shalom Hartman Institute's new and exciting "Foundations for a Thoughtful Judaism" series, which serves as an introduction to philosophical ideas in Jewish peoplehood, practice, faith, and ethics. You'll find more information about these and other adult education offerings and how to register for them on [page 12](#) and on the HNT website.

Now, *Aharei HaHagim*, after all the holidays are over, please get involved in your synagogue, encourage others to do the same. Let's continue to create a strong, vibrant Jewish community for ourselves and for future generations.

Helping Afghan Refugees

When JFS received news of the imminent arrival of many refugees from Afghanistan, they knew immediately to reach out to our HNT community. Our Social Action Committee jumped on JFS' first request, donating 5 new car seats from the **Carol Maslan z"l & Nadine Strauss Pay It Forward Fund**. We then got to work mobilizing the rest of our community to reach out to their friends and family, triggering an enormous number of generous donations and tons of volunteer support.

In the month of August, JFS received over \$320,000 in donations for refugees and more than 2,000 items from their online wish list, plus added 63 volunteers to their on-call support. Thank you to everyone who has contributed to these efforts, making a difference in the lives of at least 22 families and 104 individuals recently resettled from Afghanistan.

“Who is wise? One who learns from all people.”

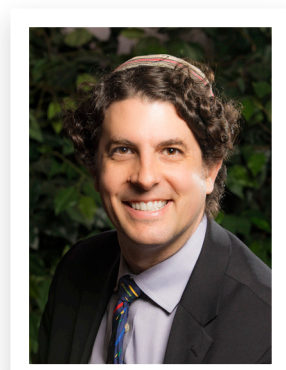

At FRS one of the important values we embrace is the notion of learning from all people. A wise person learns from everyone as mentioned in the quote above. In our efforts to bring together different groups in the congregation to learn from each other, we were successful in writing a grant to bring a new dynamic, new programming opportunity to HNT on Zoom called Better Together (<https://www.bettertogetherinabox.com/>). The Better Together program started in September and we are still open for additional teenagers ages 12-18 and participants over 65 years old. Better Together is a fully funded program this year for Jewish teens that will connect them with senior citizens in our community, from a distance on Zoom. This pandemic has changed life so drastically for our elders and Better Together is an opportunity to bring some extra smiles and entertainment to this important age demographic.

Better Together has been running in Jewish schools, synagogues, and youth groups across the country for almost six years. Better Together is a grant program with an all-inclusive curricular guide to enable teens to run safe virtual programs between tweens/teens and the elderly. This program will connect teens and elders in a

meaningful way in order to benefit and support both age groups. Better Together is new program we are starting at HNT in order to empower teens to reach out to the elderly, befriend them, and make their day a little brighter which in turn, brightens the teens' lives immeasurably.

Along with elders from the HNT community, we are also partnering with the Kline Galland Home as well for this experience. Better Together is a program developed and operated by a well-respected national foundation. Teens and elders meet together on Zoom from 11:00-11:45 and then teens meet from 11:45-12:15 on Zoom to process and continue the learning.

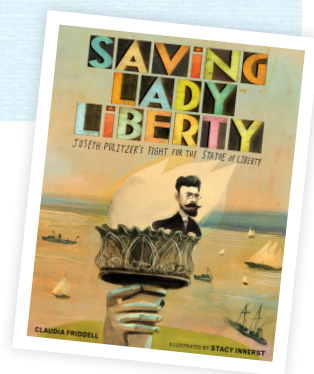

Foundations for a Thoughtful Judaism Taught by Rabbi Jacob Herber

Every Other Wednesday, beginning October 20
7:00-8:00pm via Zoom

Join Rabbi Herber for Foundations for a Thoughtful Judaism, The Shalom Hartman Institute's latest curricular project, which offers a sophisticated yet accessible introduction to philosophical ideas in Jewish peoplehood, practice, faith, and ethics. Within these four rubrics we will explore the following questions:

Peoplehood

Explores questions related to the collective experience of Jewish life: What does it mean to be part of the Jewish community? To what extent can communities hold diverse and shared values at the same time? What does Jewish Peoplehood mean today, when the centers of Jewish life, North America and Israel, are so different and independent from one another?

Faith

Explores questions related to what a relationship in God and a life of faith entails: Where does faith come from? What are the models in Jewish tradition for a complex relationship with God which includes reverence and joy, but also anger and argument? Where does doubt fit into a life of faith? Where do Jews who do not believe fit in?

Practice

Explores questions that are fundamental to Jewish practice: What is the system of mitzvot trying to accomplish? Why the need for ritual action beyond belief? How have Jewish thinkers conceived of the meaning of mitzvot in an age of radical human autonomy?

Ethics

Explores questions related to ethical obligation and decision-making: How has Jewish tradition conceived of what we owe other people? How might we approach ethical dilemmas which test our loyalties to values and to people?

Film and Discussion: Since I Been Down

October 16th and 19th and join us for a communal discussion on October 24th

Dear Friends,

The murder of George Floyd shone a light on our criminal justice system and raised the question: what can be done to make it better? The film “Since I Been Down” focuses on Washington’s states policies of sentencing and incarceration. It features the story of Kimonti Carter, a gang member at age eleven, and sentenced to 700 years in prison for his role in a drive by shooting 25 years ago. Since that time, Kimonti has become an inspirational role model, starting a prisoner run higher education program that has been implemented in three Washington prisons.

The film raises provocative ethical questions about our criminal justice system. Is our sentencing fair? Who ends up in prison, and why? Is it right that Washington has no parole? Should incarceration focus on punishment or rehabilitation and restoration to society? What are the challenges incarcerated persons face when they are in prison and when they leave prison? And, what is the impact of our criminal justice system on people of color?
