A Message from Rabbi Jacob Herber

Take a moment and contemplate the following: When you think about mitzvot (commandments) which come immediately to mind? Make a list of them in your head or, better yet, write them down.

When I gave this exercise a try, I came up with a number important and meaningful ones: davening with tallit and tefillin in the morning, studying Torah, lighting Shabbat candles, filling a backpack with school supplies for a needy child, eating matzah on Passover. After I came up with my list, I realized that all of these mitzvot revolved around me. I'm the person doing them. While I might be eating matzah with other people at the Seder table or while I might be physically praying with a minyan I'm the one actually the doer performing the mitzvah. That's true of many commandments.

There is, however, one significant exception to this paradigm, the mitzvah of lighting the candles on Hanukkah, which we will do beginning Thanksgiving Day weekend. Yes, can you believe it, Hanukkah in November!?! When the Talmud (Shabbat 21b) describes the obligation of lighting Hanukkah candles, it uses the following language: "ner ish u-beito," a candle for a person and that person's household.



So, the act of lighting Hanukkah candles falls upon everyone in the household, collectively. From a technical point of view, one could light a single candle in one's house on any given night of Hanukkah and fulfill the mitzvah of lighting for that night for everyone who happens to live in the home.

The primary placement of Hanukkah in the home is reinforced by a subsequent passage in the Talmud (Shabbat 23a). In that text, the Gemara discusses how a traveler, away from home, should do when it comes to lighting candles on Hanukkah. One might think that the lodger should light individual candles in addition to the candles that are lit by the other residents (presuming that they are also Jewish) and homeowners of the dwelling place. However, one sage takes a different approach and opines that the guest must - in some way - join in with the homeowners when they light their candles. Regardless of how it's done, the mitzvah of lighting the Hanukkah candles on that night is to be performed as a single home unit.

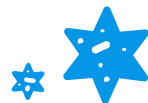
Although the concept of ner ish u-beito is one directly connected with Hanukkah, it can easily be applied to other mitzvot that we perform throughout the rest of the year. Go back to that list of mitzvot that you came up with a few minutes ago. I bet each of those mitzvot are best fulfilled with other people, whether they're

your friends, family, and/or your community. At the end of the day, one of the most beautiful aspects of mitzvot are the way they can often be performed together, with others. Some of these mitzvot may be done individually in a collective setting, while others, like the mitzvah of lighting the Hanukkah candles, are, at their core, carried out in a mutual manner.

Covid-19, unfortunately, makes collective Hanukkah candle lighting efforts a bit challenging. Whether you light your hanukkiyah on your own, with your family, or with a pod/bubble that includes extended family or friends, I hope your Hanukkah is filled with the beautiful light of your candles!

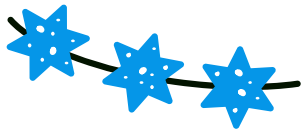

An Update on American Jewish War Heroes Yahrzeit Project

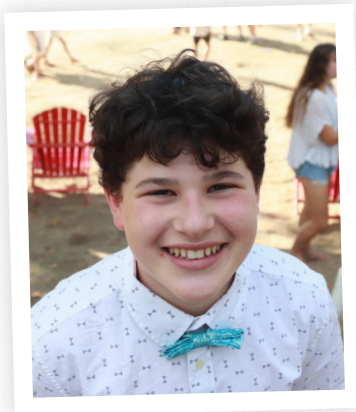
In a beautiful example of “bashert” or fate, Trea Diamant and her children are the new volunteer stewards of the data for the war hero yahrzeits included in the Mourner's Kaddish each Shabbat. At age 90, Ellis Corets, the creator of the American Jewish War Heroes Yahrzeit Project, recognized he was no longer able to annually sort and merge the precious data. Ellis embarked on this sacred mission in his 80s, spending several years manually researching, collecting and entering the data of over 3,600 Jewish service members who never returned home from overseas wars. He could not have dreamed of a more capable partner than Trea. She is computer savvy, a former Captain in the U.S. Marine Corps and a wise parent who recognized a unique family learning opportunity that blends history, patriotism and Jewish values. A match made in heaven. 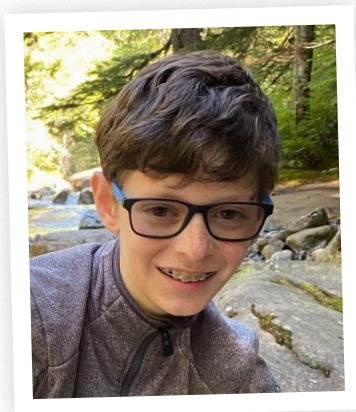
Asher Cook • November 13

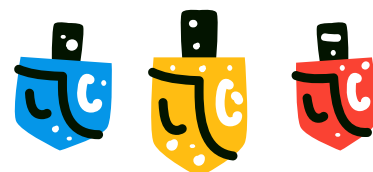
Teen Feed: Cook-At-Home Edition

A Dvar

One significant way FRS students are taking the heartfelt advice of Elie Weisel in the quote above is by engaging in the Daffodil Project this year. The Daffodil Project aspires to build a worldwide Living Holocaust Memorial by planting 1.5 million daffodils in memory of the 1.5 million children who perished in the Holocaust and in support for children suffering in humanitarian crises in the world today. The Daffodil Project has partnered with the Seattle NOW GEN Giving Circle to provide 7 new sites to participate in this project this year and we're pleased to announce HNT is one of the sites. Interested FRS families received a bag of daffodil bulbs to plant at home to serve as a special memorial to the children victims of the Shoah and injustice everywhere. The 5th graders at FRS also have planted a small garden at HNT for this important purpose as well. We teach about the Holocaust in FRS in order to inspire positive change, combat injustice, and memorialize this tragic time in our collective history. The 5th grade at FRS had the wonderful opportunity to virtually visit the Holocaust Center for Humanity last month and learned so much. The shape and color of the daffodils represent the Yellow Stars that Jews were forced to wear during the Holocaust. Yellow is the color of remembrance.

Daffodils represent our poignant hope for the future. They are resilient and return with a burst of color each spring. The daffodils honor the memory of those who perished and also serve to honor those who survived. To date, the project has planted 664,000 daffodils in over 266 locations worldwide including synagogues, schools, churches, city parks, college campuses, botanical gardens, and other community locations in Atlanta, Georgia, many states within the US, and internationally in Israel, Poland, The Netherlands, Japan, Canada, The Czech Republic, and Germany. These will be the first plantings in Washington State. So far, the other organizations participating in addition to our community includes the Hillel at the University of Washington, the Holocaust Center for Humanity, and two public schools. Thank you to all those who participated in the planting. May the daffodils remind us to always stand up for injustice and bring healing to all the broken places in the world!

This hybrid approach with instruction via Zoom on Tuesdays was conceived before we decided to pivot to online in response to the Delta wave, and with support from our school committee chairs. We have worked hard to recreate a robust program next year while keeping the FRS tuition the same as last year. We will continue to reevaluate and modify this program. Shall I Compare Thee to a Summer's Day?

New Ways of Imagining God, Jewish Practice, and Ourselves
With Rabbi Jay Rosenbaum

Monday Nights, 7:00-8:30pm via Zoom
November 1, 8, 15

This class will attempt to do the following:

- Show that our most central Jewish spiritual Jewish practice are forms of imaginative play,
- Demonstrate that our key Jewish practices reflect the creative tension between our desire for meaning (what I call "purpose") and our desire to break free of established frameworks (what I call "possibility")
- Show that the core Jewish concept of God, God's One-ness reflects the twin human aspirations of purpose and possibility, and that's why it is central to Judaism.

Session One (in October):

The Rhythm of Purpose and Possibility

We discussed how Jewish practice addresses the question: How can we commit and still remain open?

Session Two:

From Possibility to Purpose

Our lives are given greater energy and urgency when we narrow possibility and make a sacred commitment to a purpose. But commitment also generates anxiety. What if we fail? We will explore how Jewish practices help us to imagine moving from multiple possibilities to a unified choice,

and thus strengthen our courage to live a life of purpose, meaning and significance.

Session Three:

Bracha: Breaking the Boundaries

Having looked at the side of ourselves that moves from possibility to purpose, we will go in the opposite direction, and explore the part of us that breaks boundaries, explores new horizons and pushes against our limitations. Along the road, we will examine

- the connection between the concept of Bracha and the tapping of hidden human potential
- how Torah study is a hide and seek game we play with God, and why we play it
- the connection between God's mystery and our own

Session Four:

Shall I Compare Thee to a Summer's Day? New Ways of Imagining God and Ourselves

How do we describe the indescribable? We will explore the connection between the difficulty of describing God and the challenge of articulating our own deepest and most moving life experiences. In the process, we will learn what Shakespeare and the Rabbis taught us about God's uncontainability and our own.

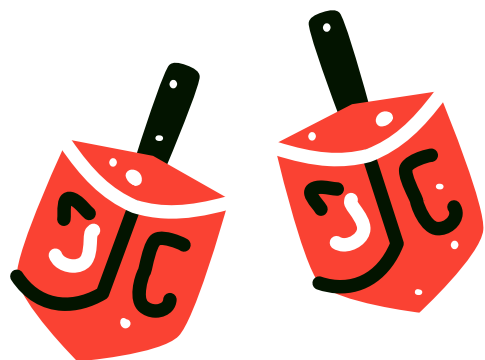

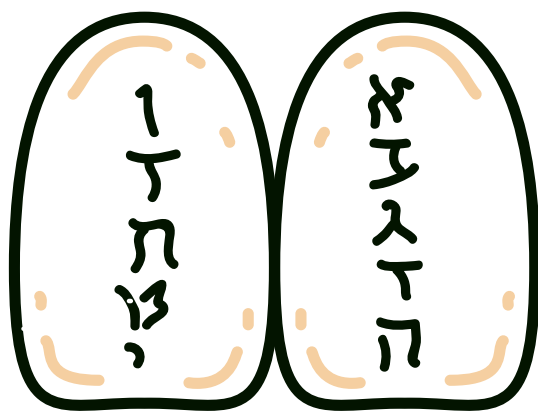

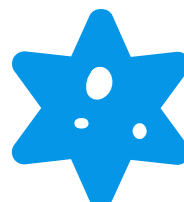
