



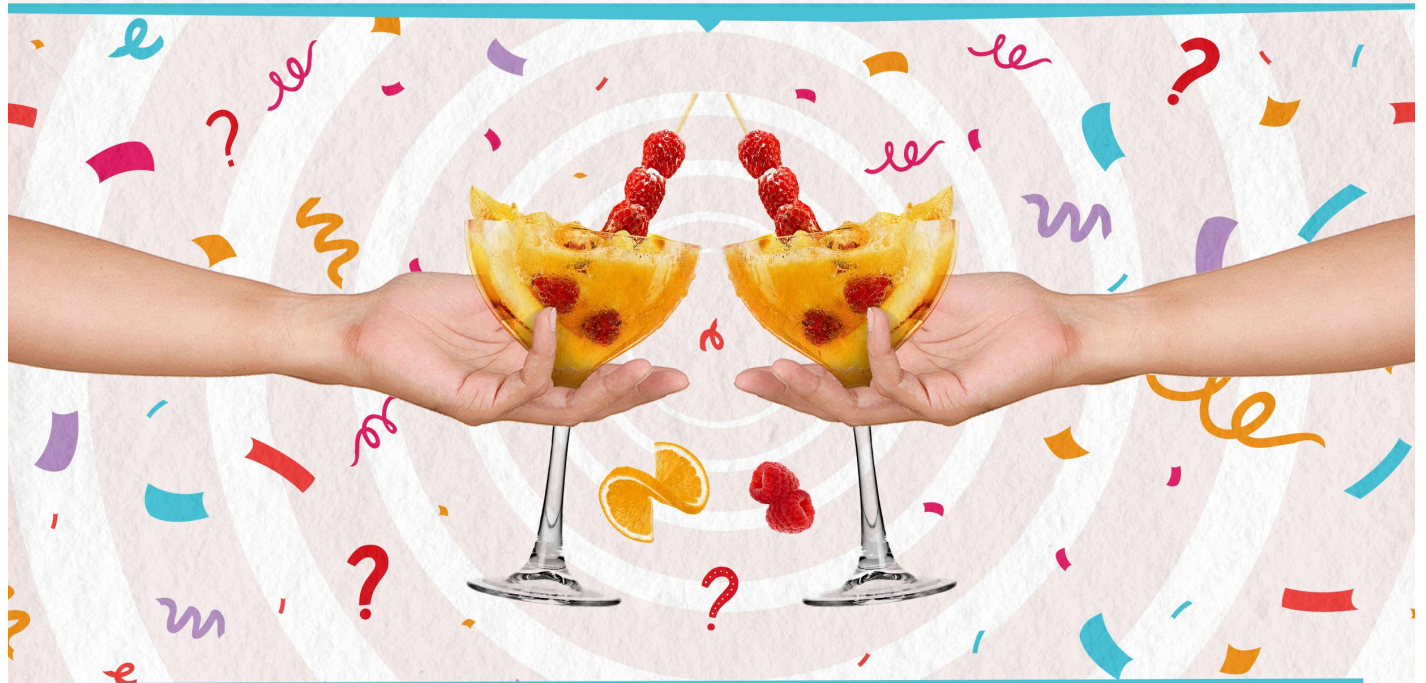

A Message from Rabbi Jacob Herber

A new secular new year, 2022, has begun, as always with the month of January. If you were to ask, most Jews would say the “Jewish New Year” starts “On Rosh Hashanah.” Technically this is correct, but the fact is the Mishnah (the earliest rabbinical text of law and lore) identifies several Jewish new years:

“The four new years are: On the first of Nisan, the new year for the kings and for the festivals; On the first of Elul, the new year for the tithing of animals . . . On the first of Tishrei, the new year for years, for the Sabbatical years and for the Jubilee years and for the planting and for the vegetables On the first of Shevat, the new year for the trees – these are the words of the House of Shammai; The House of Hillel says, on the fifteenth thereof.”

Time for Jews isn’t linear, it’s circular. There are multiple beginnings during the course of each year that occur in a system of time that comes full circle, yet at the same time moves forward, like a spiral or a helix. This ingenious conception of time allows for progress and forward motion from year to year. This conception of “Jewish time” also gives us the ability to focus on the renewal and the re-birth of different aspects of life at different moments within the same year. Judaism gives us the unique opportunity for spiritual renewal when it comes to each of the key aspects of life, allowing us, as limited human beings, the ability to appropriately focus on one major aspect at a time.

The first New Year mentioned in our Mishnah comes directly from the Torah itself. It specifies that the first month of the year is the month in which Pesah falls.

Marking Passover as the first holiday chronologically sets the thematic tone for the other holidays of the year: Passover recounts the Exodus, followed by Shavuot which relates the receiving the Torah on Mt. Sinai, followed by Sukkot, which commemorates our journey through the wilderness toward the Land of Israel. This New Year, which starts with Nisan, is a cycle that tells our particular story, as a people, and it lays the foundation for our cultural and spiritual beliefs. Beginning the year with Passover links us to our ancestors and to our essence as Jews.

The next New Year mentioned is very different – this one begins our “fiscal” year. Like any society, a Jewish one requires taxes, which need to be paid by a certain time. As the Rabbinic aphorism goes, “Im ein kemach, ein Torah - if there is no sustenance (literally flour), there is no Torah.” If one’s basic material needs aren’t met how can one attain his/her spiritual potential? This cycle indicates the continued importance of making sure the institutions we care about have the resources they need to reach their ultimate potential, whether they be in the federated or social services sector, like JFGS and JFS, or in the religious/educational sphere, like HNT, JDS, Camp Solomon Schechter, or Camp Ramah. Starting the New Year in Elul reminds us how important it is to allocate our personal resources to support our Jewish community.

The third new year is the one with which we’re most familiar. Marking the start of the month of Tishrei, Rosh Hashanah is that time when focus on ourselves – spiritually renewing our commitment to Jewish values

and to our covenant with God. Because our Sages associate Rosh Hashanah with the creation of the world, this holiday has more of a universal focus. It calls us to respond to the universalistic, human need to reflect, repent, and renew. With some similarities to the secular new year we just celebrated, and its custom of making new year's resolutions, this cycle can be characterized as having an inside-out focus. Starting the New Year with Tishrei allows us to begin with the self, and the universal human condition, and then expand outward.

The fourth and final New Year is characterized by Tu Bishvat – the new year of the trees. Coming soon (January 17th), this new year turns our focus to the natural world and the bounty nature offers us. Tu Bishvat reminds us of the connection between nature

and spirituality. It became a favorite of the Medieval Kabbalists. Today, this cycle can serve to remind us of the sacredness of the natural world, the importance of caring for our environment, and the fortune we've had in being blessed with the incredible gift of our majestic ecosystem. In celebration of this holiday many conduct a "seder" focusing on these themes, and on our connection to the land of Israel.

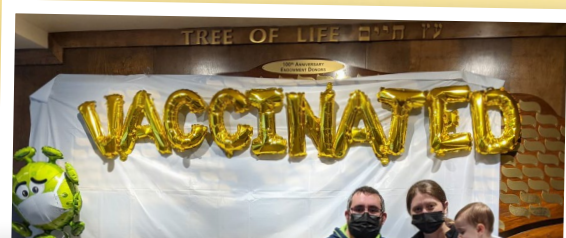
May each Jewish New Year bring with it sacred meaning and allow us to elevate our lives spiritually so that we can achieve a greater connection to God and make our world a better place in which to for everyone!

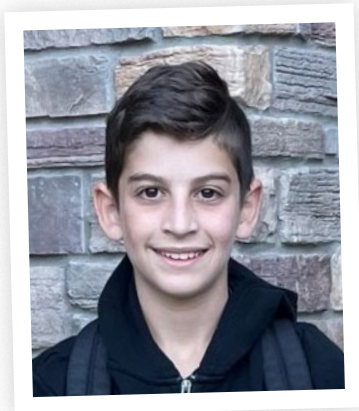
Ben Scapa • January 8

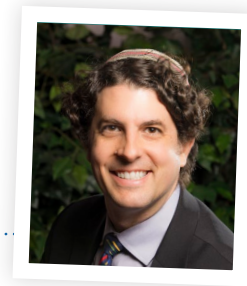

College Basketball Fever and Torah Trope



College basketball spirit and Torah cantillation rarely mix but when they do the sound is extraordinary special. Let me explain: My son Isaiah is a Junior at Gonzaga University. As you might already know, GU is a Jesuit school with a rigorous academic program and an incredible basketball team. Since Spokane is only a few hours away from Seattle, each year my family is intentional about attending fall family weekend on campus. The weekends festivities include programming for families with students of all ages. Parents are able to meet with faculty and administrators. The school is open and in full glorious display. Instead of a Hillel, Gonzaga has a vibrant Jewish student group on campus called the Jewish Bulldogs. Rabbi Dr. Elizabeth Goldstein is the academic advisor for the Jewish group. Fall family weekend typically concludes on Sunday with Mass. This year something quite remarkably Jewish occurred. For the first time in Gonzaga history since being founded on September 17, 1887, there was a beautiful Shabbat morning service for the Jewish community with a newly acquired Torah scroll in a brand-new dedicated prayer space for Jews at Gonzaga.

Securing a Torah has been a community wide effort led by Rabbi Goldstein and the Jewish Bulldogs. The journey to acquire this new Torah scroll was detailed in an article in the Jewish Telegraphic Agency [HERE](#). Thank you so much if you played a role in helping to secure the funding for the Torah. The valiant efforts of the campaign came to fruition when the Torah was

officially dedicated on campus in the fall of 2021. On the Shabbat morning during the family weekend, we read from the newly installed Torah for the first time during a Shabbat morning service. This was a moment of great excitement. The presence of a Torah after an incredible campaign solidifies a Jewish place in the Zag community. I was greatly honored to chant from the Torah during this service. The service was co-led by GU students and the Rabbi. Jewish community members from the local Spokane community were also present along with parents, faculty, and extended family members.

Right before the Torah reading it was so wonderful to hear cheers from the quad fill our space. There was a pep rally happening in the quad and the happy cheers and sounds of ecstatic joy drifted into space. We left our window open and hearing the “Go Zags” being chanted outside against the backdrop of hearing the Torah trope being sung was a very memorable and rewarding experience. The fervor of intense team spirit combined with the ancient Torah trope melody gave rise to a great cacophony of jubilee and joy. Instead of closing the window and remaining insular like so many Jewish communities have had to do over the years to exist and prosper in the non-Jewish world, we left our window open to symbolize our secure presence. Rather than retreating inward and remaining a closed and static group, by leaving the window open to our prayer space and welcoming the exuberance, we were symbolically letting our Torah pride shine brightly into the world.

Welcoming the stranger is the most repeated mitzvah or sacred obligation in the Torah. Now at Gonzaga the Jewish community is no longer a stranger because they have secured their own Torah scroll and they have a dedicated prayer and learning space on campus. The presence of a Torah on campus has enabled the Jewish community to engage in celebrations in a whole new way. Parents who have students in college can be an incredible support to their child's Jewish student body on campus. When parents get involved and help support the Jewish student body on the campuses of where their kids go to school, they are leading by example. The inclusive quality of welcoming the other has long been a strong value at Gonzaga. Acquiring a Torah and securing a space on campus to pray and learn has enabled the school community where basketball merriment is the norm to hear the sounds of Torah melodically flowing through the air on a Saturday morning. If basketball fervor and Torah trope can be intertwined at Gonzaga, my hope is that it can happen anywhere!

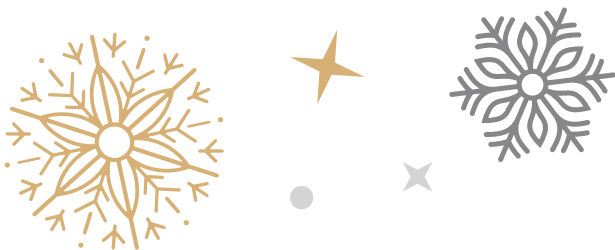

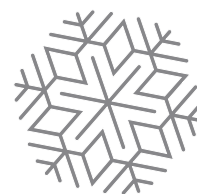

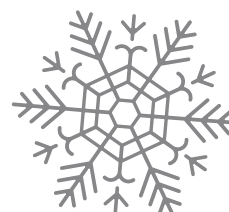
