A Message from Rabbi Jacob Herber

here's a well-known saying that's become ubiquitous around Purim and Passover: "They tried to kill us. We won. Let's eat."

The minor holiday of Purim and the major festival of Passover certainly warrant the aphorism. During Purim we read about wicked Haman failed at perpetrating genocide against us. During Passover we will read about Pharaoh and how he issued a decree to kill every male Israelite baby. The Jewish People survived both threats. Our survival was nothing short of remarkable, and it's more than worthy of celebration. It's a really good reason to feast.

Haman and Pharaoh, however, aren't the only dangers that we faced in the Purim and Passover stories. There was another danger — the threat of disappearing into the majority culture. Before the Passover story really began, Joseph had been living in Egypt for many years. When Jacob, Joseph's father, came to Egypt, Joseph introduced Jacob's grandchildren, Ephraim and Menasheh, to Jacob for the very first time. When Jacob first saw his grandchildren he asks Moses, "Who are they?" Traditional commentators interpret Jacob's query to mean that Jacob didn't recognize his grandsons because they looked like Egyptians. Later, in the beginning of the Passover story, we see that Moses is named not by his parents but by a daughter of Pharaoh. She gives him a name that's Egyptian, not Hebrew.

At Purim, we encounter two Jewish heroes. Both aren't known by their Hebrew names. Esther is her Persian name that is often associated with the Babylonian god Ishtar. The text tells us that her Hebrew name was Hadassah, meaning myrtle. Mordekhai is a Persian name that's often associated with the Babylonian god Marduk.

As Jews living in America we can learn a lot from these heroes. They had non-Jewish names and dressed like their neighbors but still managed to have strong Jewish identities and play essential roles in miraculous events that saved the Jewish People. Even though these Jews were perceived as completely assimilated, they found a way to live in both cultures. We learn from these two narratives that partaking in one civilization doesn't exclude one from the other. Living in both civilizations or cultures, Jewish and American, isn't only possible, it's enriching.

Many Jews throughout our history saw assimilation as a threat to Judaism. Now that we've experienced Purim and are on the threshold of Passover let's celebrate the fact that assimilation didn't kill us in ancient Egypt or in ancient Persia. With care, dedication, and intention we can live and thrive fully as Americans and Jews. Being a part of American culture doesn't have to destroy the Jewish part of who we are if we're careful to cultivate our Jewish identity, and also live by our Jewish values. Immersing ourselves in American and Jewish cultures can be a big win for us. So let's eat!

# "Hametz" during Passover



We are commanded not to eat, see, or possess any "hametz" during Passover. Hametz, usually translated as "leaven," is technically any one of the five biblical grain species – wheat, barley, rye, spelt, or oats – that has been in contact with water for more than 18 minutes. That's why matzah is OK during Passover, but bread isn't. Alas, beer and whiskey, with rare exceptions, are made from these grains, so they are not kosher for Passover. So that we don't have hametz in our possession, we put any hametz we want to put away for Passover in a separate space, and we sell it to a non-Jew for the duration of the holiday.

### Fast of the Firstborn

Since the firstborn of the Egyptians died so that our ancestors could get free from Egypt, there is a custom that Jewish first-born children fast as a sign gratitude that we weren't killed. The fast of the firstborn is marked starting at sunrise on the day of the seder and continues until sundown. However, if you're a firstborn you can be exempted from the requirement to fast by attending a seudat mitzvah, a "mitzvah meal." We will hold a siyyum, the completion of a tractate of learning, on that morning (Friday, April 15) following our streamed morning minyan. Join us for a last pre-Passover bagel and l'hayim before Passover whether you're fasting or not.

#### About Rabbi Jeffrey Salkin

With the regular appearance of his award-winning blog, "Martini Judaism: for those who want to be shaken and stirred," published by the Religion News Service, Jeffrey Salkin has risen to the forefront of being one of American Judaism's most prolific and most-quoted rabbis and thought leaders.

Ever since his first book, *Putting God on the Guest List: How to Reclaim The Spiritual Meaning of Your Child's Bar or Bat Mitzvah* (Jewish Lights Publishing), Rabbi Salkin has been known for his writing, teaching and activism. His books are on such subjects as making Jewish ritual meaningful; struggling with the meaning of masculinity in today's world; interpreting Israel and Zionism to Jews and non-Jews; and the task of reclaiming Judaism's central role as a takes-no-prisoners, speaktruth-to-power-and-culture religious tradition.

Because of his national reputation as an American Jewish thought leader, the Chautauqua Institution, America's iconic educational and cultural community, invited Rabbi Salkin to deliver the keynote address for its week on religion, in summer, 2020.

Rabbi Salkin's essays have appeared in the *Washington Post, The Huffington Post, Tablet, Mosaic, Forward,* and *JTA*. He has discussed the American political scene on CNN and the BBC. He has contributed articles to scholarly journals. Several of his books have won national awards.

His colleagues have described him as "courageous," "always relevant," and "one of American Judaism's true public intellectuals."

Rabbi Salkin serves as the rabbi of Temple Israel in West Palm Beach, Florida. His hobbies include playing guitar, reading voraciously, and consuming vast quantities of coffee.

# Seattle Jewish Community Ukraine Challenge

# A Message from Director of Education Dr. Eliyahu Krigel, CJE



### **A Dvar**

"It is a great mitzvah to be happy always, and to strengthen oneself to push away the sadness and the black bitterness with all of one's might."

-Rebbe Nachman in Likutei Hamorah, Part II 24:1:1 (1772-1810)

s we prepare for Passover and the time representative of the birth of our communal nation, bringing happiness and joy into our lives is more important than ever. Simcha or joy is critical to leading a fully meaningful life. Rebbe Nachman in the quote above stresses the need to continually strive to be happy. Notice the second part of the sentence in the quote above after the comma. Rebbe Nachman focuses in on the process of strengthening oneself to actually push away the sadness. In this case the quest to be happy is a concerted effort that is continually made. While some people naturally wake up happy in the morning, for many pushing away the sadness and the black bitterness indeed takes all of one's might. To do this we can ask for help, rely on our network of support, and have confidence in ourselves to maintain our expectations and strive to achieve our goals.

I often love asking students what is the meaning of life? Some shout out 42 as a nod to the Hitchhikers Guide to the Galaxy by Douglas Adams. Some say to always follow your passions. Others suggest doing what you love brings you great happiness and meaning. What do you do to bring happiness and meaning into your life? Finding time and space to bring activities of joy and happiness into our lives and into the lives our children helps the whole family system. If living a happy meaningful life equals X over Y, then what is X and what is Y? X symbolizes our aspirations while

Y represents our achievements. Your achievements can be great but if your aspirations were too large then you might continually be unhappy. Striking the right balance is unique to each person.

Below are the multiple names for happiness or joy in Hebrew. Just as the Eskimos have many names for snow because snow influences so many of their experiences, so too do we have many names in Hebrew for the word joy or happiness. As we start to move from pandemic to endemic, bring happiness into our lives is more important than ever. The joy and laughter of FRS students filling our hallways at HNT is what makes me happy. May we all have the power and strength to bring more happiness into our lives on a consistent basis! I hope you and your family have a meaningful and happy Passover! Hag Pesach Sameah!

Simcha (Hebrew: שמחה), happiness more generally, or a celebration (e.g. a wedding, bar/bat mitzvah), it is also a name for both males and females

Osher (Hebrew: אושר,), a deeper, lasting happiness Orah (Hebrew: אורה), either "light" or "happiness" Gila (Hebrew: גילה), an exuberant outburst of joy or the happiness of discovery

Rina (Hebrew: רינה), refreshing happiness Ditza (Hebrew: דיצה), a sublime joy

Sasson (Hebrew: ששון), a sudden unexpected happiness Tzahala (Hebrew: צהלה), either "happiness" or "dancing" Chedva (Hebrew: חדווה), the happiness of togetherness




