A Message from Rabbi Herber

The High Holy Days are a powerful time in our Jewish calendar set aside for spiritual renewal. We enter this period on the Shabbat prior to Rosh Hashanah with Selihot meaning forgiveness. It refers to the solemn penitential prayers recited by prior to the onset of the High Holy Days. We traditionally gather for study and conversation, and then for services.

The ten-day period, the Days of Awe, begins with Rosh Hashanah (literally, "Head of the Year") and culminates on Yom Kippur (The Day of Atonement). Our spirit during these days is marked by introspection, prayer, and repentance. It's a time of remembering mingled with a time to look ahead to the new year. It's also a time to be together as a community. An endeavor that has been more than challenging these last three years.

May we all find the inspiration and support over these High Holidays to individually, and as a community, pursue repentance, prayer, and acts of loving kindness so that our next year may be more hopeful and more meaningful than our last.

COVID-19 Protocols

Consistent with our existing Covid protocols, masks are not required and vaccinations are required for those who are eligible. Fully vaccinated is defined as two weeks after the full series of shots appropriate for your age group. For all programs taking place at HNT, we will be operating on the honor system. The Youth and Family Programing taking place at SJCC does require proof of vaccination for all attendees over 6 months. Selichot • Saturday, September 17 • 8:30 PM Film & Discussion: *The Quarrel* • 10:30 PM - 11:15 PM Service

S'lichot services will follow the film screening and discussion of *The Quarrel*. Set in 1948 Montreal on Rosh Hashanah, *The Quarrel* tells the story of Chaim, a Yiddish writer, who is forced to think of his religion when he's asked to be the tenth in a minyan. As he sits in the park, he suddenly sees an old friend whom he hasn't seen since they quarreled when they were yeshiva students together. Hersh, a rabbi, survived Auschwitz and his faith was strengthened by his ordeal, while Chaim escaped the Nazis, but had lost his faith long before. The two walk together, reminisce, and argue passionately about themselves, their actions, their lives, their religion, their old quarrel, and their friendship. This special program, featuring a discussion led by Rabbi Herber, is a great introduction to the spiritual work we all need to do to prepare for the High Holidays. Register at h-nt.org/selichot.

FAQ



What is required to enter in-person services?

An Access Pass is required for each adult for secure entry to Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services. Please write your name on the enclosed Access Pass(es) prior to the holidays and have them in-hand as you enter the property. Thank you for doing your part to ensure the safety and security of our community.

Is there a cost for guests attending our services?

If you are a Platinum, Gold, Silver or Bronze level member we will not be suggesting a donation for your guests. To help defray costs, others will be asked if they wish to make a suggested donation of \$180 per person for each of the two holidays. See page 5 for details on required guest registration.

How can I reserve a seat (designated by a blue slipcover)?

You can reserve* a seat if you:

- · Are a Platinum or Gold Member
- Have a nameplate on a seat
- Use a wheelchair or have mobility issues that make it difficult to navigate the Sanctuary/Feinberg Social Hall setup

*Seats will be presumed unused two hours after the start of services and released for general seating

For whom is Yizkor (the Memorial Service) recited?

Yizkor may be said for all deceased loved ones, parents, grandparents, other family and friends.

Though some follow the tradition of leaving during the Yizkor service if their immediate family members are still alive, all are encouraged to stay.

What if I need hearing assistance?

We have hearing assistance devices available in the back corner of the Sanctuary. We recommend bringing a pair of earbud headphones to plug into the device for a more comfortable fit.

Fragrance-Free

Please refrain from using fragrances (perfumes, colognes, etc.), as there are members who are highly allergic to these substances. Gum chewing is also inappropriate in the worship spaces.



FAQ: Parking & Transportation



Who may park in the synagogue parking lot?

You may park in the synagogue parking lot if you are a Platinum, Gold or Silver level member with a parking placard.

If I have a state disabled permit or must be dropped close to the door, what can I do?

Proceed into the main parking lot and use the Valet Parking service, available beginning 45 minutes before each service. There will not be Valet for the 6:00 PM Mincha service on Rosh Hashanah Day 1 and the lot will be open to all for that service only. Due to space limitations, there is no self-parking for disabled permits. *No advance arrangements are necessary.*

Where do I park if I don't have a state disabled permit but I can't manage the walk from off-site parking?

Use our courtesy shuttle service from the Mercerwood Shore Club parking lot (4150 E Mercer Way). Marked shuttles will be running during the hours listed below.

If I don't have a special need, where can I park?

ONLY these areas have been authorized:

- The SJCC parking lot (except where marked "No Parking 24/7")
- Mercerwood Shore Club, 4150 E Mercer Way (except "No Parking" area)

Please do not park anywhere that states "NO HNT Parking" as a courtesy to our neighbors as well as being mindful about parking in fire lanes or blocking driveways. If you park in any undesignated area you risk being towed at your own expense by the city. *The boat launch is not available for parking*. We encourage you to carpool and use our shuttle service.
