



A Message from Rabbi Jacob Herber

s you receive this edition of the HaKol we're all beginning our preparations for the High Holy Days, known in Hebrew as the Yamim Noraim, the "Days of Awe." We recognize that another year is coming to an end and as we look forward to 5783 we're filled with both anticipation and anxiety. What will the year be like? Will we be blessed? Will it be one devoid of daily reminders of infection rates and Covid waves? Will we have lives filled with health and fulfillment? Or, on the other hand, will our lives be filled with continued anxiety, conflict, and strife? Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur bring a moment of evaluation of the past and cautious anticipation of the future.

These sentiments are expressed in our services on Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur through the liturgy of the Mahzor, the High Holiday prayer book. I collect Siddurim and Mahzorim because I am fascinated by the many different rites and matbeyot (liturgical prayer formulations) used by the Jewish People. One of those High Holiday prayer books is The Koren Rosh Hashanah Mahzor, edited none other by the former, late Chief Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks. It was published as a new addition to the liturgy and commentary of the High Holidays. In his introduction, Rabbi Sacks writes that "The genius of Judaism was to take eternal truths and translate them into time, into lived experiences." He suggests that "Rosh Hashana, the anniversary of

the creation of humanity, invites us to live and feel the human condition in graphic ways."

Rabbi Sacks then outlines ten major lessons that are taught through the medium of Rosh Hashana and the High Holiday season. Each of theme is found in the Mahzor. They give us cause for contemplation, meditation and evaluation.

"The first thing it tells us is that life is short." Rabbi Sacks reminds us of the "U'netane Tokef" prayer and the stark reality that it paints for us of our mortality. Life and death are held in the balance at this time of year.

"The second is: life itself, each day, every breath we take, is the gift of God." He reminds us that we can't take anything for granted. We don't know what lies ahead in the coming next year, let alone the next day. Each day is a special gift.

"Third, we are free. Judaism is the religion of the free human being freely responding to the God of freedom." We have free choice and the ability to choose good or evil. We can willingly do teshuvah, repentance. So much is in our hands.

"Fourth, life is meaningful." We aren't accidently put on this earth. We're here for a purpose. It's our responsibility to ensure that we live up to our greatest potential. We know we have the ability to make of life

something meaningful for ourselves, for our families, for our communities, and for our world.

"Fifth, life isn't easy." Unfortunately, we've come to understand this all too well from living through the Covid pandemic. Each of us has moments of despondency, difficulty, and frustration. So many of us of us are in need of healing of one form or another.

"Sixth, life may be hard, but it can still be sweet, the way the challah and the apple are on Rosh Hashana when we dip them in honey." It's important to be optimistic, to look forward with hope and faith. This has always been the Jewish way. To live as a Jew is to be concerned about the small things in life, and to never stop giving back to the world. We can make life sweet for others as well.

"Seventh, our life is the single greatest work of art we will ever make." We're God's partners in the process of creation and renewal. This is no small task, and it's no small challenge. We can create a new art form by living our lives in such a way that they're meaningful, as well as aesthetic.

"Eighth, we are what we are because of those who came before us." As Jews we recognize that we are links in a long chain of history and tradition. We're not disconnected from the past. While the Jewish People still exists, it's our responsibility to maintain our continuity well into the future. Rabbi Sacks reminds us that the reason we recall on Rosh Hashana our patriarchs and our matriarchs, as well as Hannah and Jeremiah, is that they all bring us messages of hope for the future.

"Ninth, we are heirs to another kind of greatness too, that of the Torah itself and its high demands, its strenuous ideals, its panoply of mitzvot, its intellectual and existential challenges." Being a Jew is a privilege because we're the recipients of a remarkable heritage. We're called upon to be God's witnesses here on earth. As Judaism sets the bar high, we need to do the same in the way we live, and in our capacity to do good in the world.

"And finally comes the sound of the shofar, piercing our defense that is a wordless cry in a religion of words, a sound produced by a breath as if to tell us that that is all life is – a mere breath – yet breath is nothing less than the spirit of God within us." This intersection between us and God is part of both the theology and the liturgy of Rosh Hashana and also of Yom Kippur.

These are days of great challenge and of immense importance. We come together as a community recognizing our foibles and our weaknesses, as well as the remarkable uniqueness our heritage. We come with hopes and dreams, and pray that they may be fulfilled. We don't know what to expect during the coming year, but we hope and, with faith, we pray that our lot will be good and our lives blessed.

As we prepare for the new year of 5783, I pray that it will be a good year for us all. May it be a year of blessing, a year of health and personal growth, a year of peace and less conflict in our community and our country, a year of security and peace for The State of Israel, a year of well-being for the entire Jewish people, and a year of fulfillment for all humanity.

Set in 1948 Montreal on Rosh Hashanah, *The Quarrel* tells the story of Chaim, a Yiddish writer, who is forced to think of his religion when he's asked to be the tenth in a minyan. As he sits in the park, he suddenly sees an old friend whom he hasn't seen since they quarreled when they were yeshiva students together. Hersh, a rabbi, survived Auschwitz and his faith was strengthened by his ordeal, while Chaim escaped the Nazis, but had lost his faith long before. The two walk together, reminisce, and argue passionately about themselves, their actions, their lives, their religion, their old quarrel, and their friendship. This special program, featuring a discussion led by Rabbi Herber, is a great introduction to the spiritual work we all need to do to prepare for the High Holidays.



Ben Raskin • September 1





Message from the President

Feel the Goose Bumps

July 1979. Here I was ... sitting alone on a plane flying from London to Israel. I was 23 years old and had just left my first job - working at Andersen Consulting - and looking forward to fulfilling my dream before starting Grad school in September. That dream was spending time in Israel.

12 years earlier: When Israel was attacked and the Six Day War broke out in 1967, the country was in its infancy - only 19 years old! That's hard to imagine today. I was just 11, but the War and the possibility of Israel not existing had a major impact on me. And just six years later, attending Yom Kippur Services while starting college as a 17-yearold freshman, the Rabbi announced that Israel had been attacked again. The Yom Kippur War had started. After the first three days, the situation was dire for the country and the Jewish people. But we turned it around and survived. I knew then I had to get to Israel.

Today, an Israel trip is commonplace for our youth. My eldest, Rachel, went to Israel on the Jewish Day School 8th grade trip and my younger daughter Shayna went on Birthright. Forty-plus years ago, the opportunities were more limited.

Back to 1979, I had the time and the resources to make an early dream come true. So, I put the plan in place - a week in London seeing plays and sightseeing and then six weeks touring Israel staying at youth hostels throughout the country.

I booked a flight on EI AI even though it was more expensive than TWA, the alternative at the time. How could I fly into Israel for the first time and not be on an Israeli airline? I purposely booked a window seat so I wouldn't miss a moment of the experience of entering Israel. And ... here I was on that EI AI flight from London to Israel.

As we started our descent over Israel, I expected to see a lot of sand. To my amazement, there were trees and crops and just a lot of green. I knew I was starting to experience something special. And then over the loudspeaker, the crew blasted out Yerushalayim Shel Zahav -Jerusalem of Gold. The entire plane started singing. Tears came to my eyes and the most incredible goose bumps spread over my arms. Even though I knew no one on the plane, I felt a strong kinship with everyone.



Why am I writing about this? Fast forward to August 19, 2022. I'm sitting in the sanctuary enjoying our Rhythm & Jews service Friday night. A great crowd for Kabbalat of 125-150 people. Schmoozing outside and in the foyer beforehand. People came for the wonderful Service. For the fantastic Rhythm & Jews ensemble. For the terrific Jacob Addess bar mitzvah. For the fabulous ShaPotluck after. Everyone was in great spirits and having a great time.

Then we turned to page 29, and Julia Perry from the Rhythm & Jews ensemble started singing Miklot Mayim Rabim. Julia is a talented congregant heading off to Boston to start her freshman year at the Berklee College of Music. It was incredibly beautiful and inspiring. There was some singing with her, but mostly people just took in the moment. And, yes, my eyes teared up and I got those goose bumps. And I felt that Jewish kinship with everyone in the room. Maybe it was being away for two years. Maybe it was that special feeling you only get when you're emersed in "all things Jewish". But I had not experienced that feeling for a long time. The rest of the service and the ruach at the ShaPotluck was icing on the cake. But that one moment was special!

Attending services remotely can be nice and spiritual. And for some it may be the only option. But it's not the same as being together. It's the community. It's being part of something special. It's being Jewish. We've lived through a very tough two years physically and mentally. We've adjusted to remote living - phone calls and Zooms. But many of us forget what we're missing.

My message: At different times in our lives we fly solo and other times we travel in flocks. If you are able, please come to High Holiday Services in person. I miss you. HNT misses you. The community misses you. And whether you realize it or not, you miss us.



A Message from Director of Education Dr. Eliyahu Krigel, CJE



A Dvar

"All beginnings are difficult!"

-Rashi on Exodus 15:5:1

Then we start something new for the first time, we take a leap of faith into the unknown. Rashi in the quote above reminds us beginnings are difficult but not insurmountable. This month the laughter and learning of students will once again fill the halls and classrooms at HNT when FRS officially begins on September 11, 2022, with in-person learning. Rashi in the quote above says beginnings are challenging but yet does not shy away from the obstacle. We all have the power to turn our greatest obstacles in meaningful learning opportunities. As we move to treating Covid-19 as an endemic, we once again find ourselves pivoting in a deliberate and thoughtful way. We have reimagined FRS so as to fit the diverse needs of our community. This year we will be meeting in-person on Tuesdays, Saturdays, and Sundays. In addition, we will also offer a distance learning opportunity on Tuesday for students on Zoom.

As we prepare for the beginning of the year with the High Holidays, we have the opportunity to engage in Teshuva, Tefillah, and Tzedakah. Teshuva or returning helps us come back to our own original canvas of our lives. Teshuva helps us step back and take a look at our lives. How can we bridge the gap between the people we are and the people we are meant to be? How can we align ourselves with the values we hold so dear? Tefillah is our porthole to transformation. How can we keep the conversation going with our Creator? By

staying in constant dialogue. Tzedakah or justice is our reminder to carry out and live a just life. Tzedakah is our reminder to be a blessing to others by helping to support the community in every way we can.

Whether the connection is in our own souls, or to God, or to our family, the theme of the holidays provides us with an opportunity to connect within, with something more than ourselves, and to our sacred community. The Talmud in Chagigah 15a teaches, "Just as golden vessels and glass vessels have a remedy even when they have broken, as they can be melted down and made into new vessels, so too a student of Torah, although they might have missed the mark on occasion, has a remedy." The remedy here is to come together and fully participate in FRS this year.

The first 50 families registered will be entered into a raffle to win a new laptop on the first day back to school. This year we will continue to offer meaningful learning opportunities online and in-person. Whether taking the distance learning approach online or opting for in-person learning on Tuesdays, at FRS we meet our students where they are at in a sincere and sensitive way and then take their Hebrew and Judaic learning to the next level.




