A Message from Rabbi Jacob Herber

Whenever we reach the end of the High Holiday season there's always a big letdown. The Yamim Noraim, Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret, and Simhat Torah with their services and rituals and home festivities, create a sense of heightened spirituality and, especially this year, community. We anticipate with anxiety the High Holy Days and we look forward to the beautiful festival of Sukkot and to its conclusion with Simhat Torah, as we dance with the Sifrei Torah.

After these holidays there's a long gap before the next major festival, which is actually the holiday of Passover. With stops along the way - including Hanukkah, Tu B'Shvat, and Purim - we have some opportunities for home rituals and sacred worship opportunities.

But with much of September and October filled with the holiday season, we're challenged to create those moments of spirituality and community solidarity during the rest of the year as well. It's not as easy as the month of Tishrei, but it can still be done. In fact, the rest of the year offers us many opportunities for synagogue involvement, community volunteer opportunities, and intellectual growth.

Recently, I shared a book with a member of our Board, who in turn shared it with her fellow Board members. The book, written by Dr. Ron Wolfson, a professor of education at the American Jewish University in Los

Angeles is entitled *Relational Judaism: Using the Power of Relationships to Transform the Jewish Community*. Ron, a dedicated Conservative Jew and a wonderful educator, suggests that the goal of synagogue life is to allow its members to become a Relational Jew, a Jew who views Judaism as impacting virtually all of one's relationships. He suggests that there are indicators of Jewish identification and internal Jewish identity which are shaped by the relationships of life:

“Do I see myself as Jewish? Does my Jewishness influence the way I live my life: my work, my purpose, my hobbies, my indulgences, the food I eat, the music I listen to?

Do I see myself as part of a Jewish family? How do I relate to being a Jewish father, daughter, grandfather, sister, partner, spouse?

Do I locate myself among a network of good friends, friends who will be there for me in good times and bad?

Do I engage in lifelong learning about Judaism? Do I try on Jewish practice? Do I commit to living a Jewish life? Does Jewish observance shape the way I live: the rhythm of my week, the calendar of my year?

Do I support the community, a synagogue, JCC, Federation, Jewish defense organization?

Do I connect to the Jewish people, the “tribe”?

Do I care about the State of Israel?

Do I work to repair the world? Do I wrestle with God?”

These questions should challenge us after the High Holy Days to get involved in our synagogue and community programs and take advantage of the opportunities we have. I encourage you to participate in our many opportunities for communal prayer. Make time for our Shabbat services – Friday night, Shabbat morning and Shabbat afternoon – opportunities to join with the community in celebrating the sanctity of Shabbat and holidays.

I also want to encourage you to grow in your Jewish learning. There are many wonderful, adult education offerings available to you. Join us for Scholar-In-Residence weekends in the Winter and Spring. All of us, regardless of our level, can always grow in our knowledge.

I hope you will take advantage of the many opportunities to be involved with our Social Action Committee. We are part of a larger family and we should be there for all the members of our Jewish community and the world beyond.

There is no reason that after the holiday season there should be a lull in the time that we spend in the synagogue or with our involvement in Jewish rituals and living. In fact, the holiday season should merely be a catalyst for us to become more involved, more learned, and better Relational Jews in the months to come.

I hope to see you often around the synagogue throughout the course of 5783.

The Jewish Road to Character: The Study and Practice of Mussar as a Jewish Spiritual Path for Our Times

In our confusing and contentious time, many in our Jewish community are seeking to find a greater sense of grounding in core values and ideas which can guide us, uplift us, and inspire us to become the best persons we can be. Mussar has been a part of our rich Jewish heritage since Biblical times. Over the millennia it has grown from a concept in the Hebrew Bible to a vast literature; from a Movement born in 19th century Europe which in our time has been uncovered and recovered as an authentic and living Jewish spiritual practice. In our learning we will explore Mussar as an authentic Jewish spiritual path for our times, and our lives.

Friday evening after Shabbat Dinner - Finding the Jewish Road to Character - A Path and a Discipline for our Complicated Times.

What is Mussar? Why is it relevant in the 21st century? How can it inform and ground me in my life, my relationships and in the world I live in?

Shabbat Morning - Parshat Vayishlach - Torah Through a Mussar Lens

Rabbi Gurvis, a contributor to the 2019 publication, The Mussar Torah Commentary, will lead us in a discussion of how Mussar tradition provides an additional and little known lens through which to study our weekly parashah.

Shabbat Luncheon - Mussar as a Tool in A Time of Anger

Rabbi Gurvis will lead an examination based on the teachings of contemporary Mussar master, Rabbi Shlomo Wolbe z"l on the subject of Anger or Patience. How can we employ Mussar as a tool in navigating our complex human emotions and reactions in uneasy situations and time? How can Mussar teachings and practice help us make better informed decisions in our day-to-day lives?

Sunday Morning Brunch - Choices and Challenges

In this session we will look at some of the topics on the Mussar "curriculum" which is our life curriculum. How can I explore the study and practice of Mussar in 2022 and beyond? How can this part of our rich Jewish heritage inform my life, my decisions and my well-being.

About Rabbi Gurvis:

Rabbi Eric Gurvis is a graduate of SUNY-Albany and was ordained at the Hebrew Union College Jewish Institute of Religion in New York. Rabbi Gurvis has served congregations in New York City; Jackson, MS; Teaneck, NJ; Newton, MA; and is currently the rabbi of Congregation Sha'arei Shalom in Ashland, MA.

He trained as a Mussar Facilitator with The Mussar Institute and now serves as Director of Chaverim and Engagement for The Mussar Institute. He is a contributor to The Mussar Torah Commentary (published 2019).

Rabbi Gurvis facilitates Mussar groups throughout the Greater Boston area and in Western Massachusetts. Rabbi Gurvis is also a graduate of the Shalom Hartman Institute's Rabbinic Leadership Initiative and is a Senior Rabbinic Fellow of the Institute. He and his wife, Laura Kizner Gurvis are blessed with four children and four grandchildren.

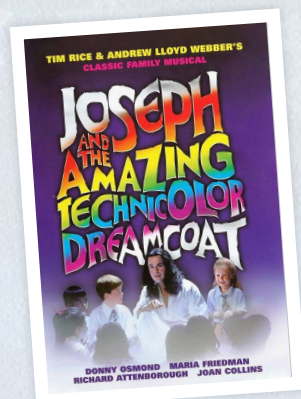

Message From the President

Because It's the Right Thing to Do

Schindler's List. Like many of you, I've watched the movie many times. Though entertaining, clearly, I don't watch it because it's enjoyable. Schindler's List is a reminder of a time we can never forget. And that, of course, is important. But Schindler's List is also about hope and the inherent goodness of people.

I always remember the details of a particular scene towards the end of the movie. The war is essentially over. The Nazis have left the factory; only the Jews and Schindler remain. It's Friday night. Schindler has the Rabbi light the candles and chant Kiddush. Everyone seems to be in disbelief as they lived in fear of being sent to the gas chamber every moment for the last few years. And now they are openly celebrating their Jewishness. It's quite moving.

As Schindler is getting ready to leave knowing a poor fate awaits him, he is presented a gift from everyone – a gold ring with the inscription in Hebrew “Whoever saves one life saves the world entire”, taken from the Talmud. <https://youtu.be/jsHYWSYAZMo> Schindler breaks down saying he could have done so much more. A gold pin could have saved two lives. The car could have saved 10 lives. The scene always brings tears to my eyes.

Having the impact of an Oskar Schindler is rare. But we do have the ability and opportunity to make peoples' lives better and, in return, make our own lives better. And where better to start than in our own community.

Most of us hear about HNT's Mitzvah Corps, but

few really know who is involved and what they do. This group of volunteers is the secret gem of HNT. That is ... secret until you need them. They help when someone in our community has a need. The need doesn't need to be big. The needy doesn't need to be young or old. It's just whenever, we as a community can help make life a little easier when another in our community hits a low spot.

Here's just a small sampling of Mitzvah Corps activities:

- Providing meals during Shiva, Shabbat, or a “a thinking of you meal” for someone who isn't feeling well after surgery or is unable to grocery shop or cook for themselves
- Offering to visit a person who is alone and wants some company or is in an assisted living facility such as the Summit or Kline-Galland and would like company or a meal
- Providing rides to services or to medical appointments or even to the grocery store
- Sending cards for a speedy recovery or a “thinking of you” for someone having a difficult time due to caregiving for a family member
- Reaching out on the High Holidays to provide goody bags filled with challah, apples, and honey to wish L'Shanah Tovah
- Delivering challah and wine or grape juice for a Shabbat meal

The other day I was having coffee with Judy Ziedman, the chair of the Mitzvah Corps. She told me a story which represents what Mitzvah Corps is about. In her words: "Several years ago, I made a delivery of challah and wine to a congregant as requested by Rabbi Rosenbaum; a family member had passed away so Rabbi wanted to let them know we were thinking of him. I had never met the individual though he was a longtime HNT member. I spent several hours just chatting with his wife. She was so appreciative of HNT's thoughtfulness and understood the real value the Mitzvah Corps brought during a tough time that she immediately signed up as a volunteer. She continues to be involved and has helped out so many times on different Mitzvah Corps projects!"

So how can the Mitzvah Corps affect you personally? I suggest thinking about the Mitzvah Corps in three ways:

1. If you feel something would help your situation like a ride, food, company, or whatever, do not hesitate to contact the office or anyone in a leadership role at HNT.
2. If you know someone is a Mitzvah Corps volunteer, thank them for their kindness and their time.

3. Sign up to help. You do not have to make a big time commitment. Get on the Mitzvah Corps mailing list. You can be a teenager, a senior citizen, or anyone in between. When you see an opportunity to volunteer that fits your schedule and appeals to you, volunteer. It can be once a month or once a year. But if you don't know about the opportunity, you'll never have the chance to volunteer and do a real mitzvah.

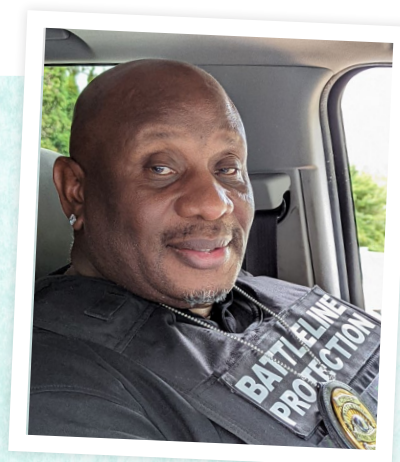

A Message from Director of Education Dr. Eliyahu Krigel, CJE



A Dvar

"The opposite of love is not hate, it's indifference. The opposite of art is not ugliness, it's indifference. The opposite of faith is not heresy, it's indifference. And the opposite of life is not death, it's indifference!"

-Elie Wiesel (Romanian born American professor, author, Nobel Laureate, and Holocaust Survivor, 1928-2016)

The quote above from Elie Wiesel reminds us all of the need to dramatically and courageously step up and stand up when we witness injustice. Rather than being bystanders and not acting, when injustice occurs, we are all obligated to do something about it and become upstanders. School in general, whether we're talking about middle school, high school, or college, is a time to question and explore. What if your exploration is tainted and forced in a negative direction while in school? This unfortunate challenge might be the experience of being Jewish for students in contemporary high schools and colleges today. As a consequence of growing antisemitism, the Anti-Defamation League conducted a survey of Jewish youth to explore the question of racism in middle and high schools and also on the University campus in our own time. The reality of being a Jewish youth in America in the 21st Century is that the probability of experiencing racism firsthand is unfortunately very likely. The ADL found that many middle and high school students regularly faced antisemitic comments and harassment in their schools and communities. Instead of standing up for these injustices, many youth continue to remain silent in the face of this type of oppression. The ADL created Words to Action® to confront growing antisemitism in American schools and also on the college and university level.

In an effort to combat the challenge of antisemitism, HNT will be hosting Words to Action®, for all Jewish middle and high school students. This program is open to the community. Rob Hicks, ADL Assistant Regional Director, will be at HNT on November 6 from 12:30-3:30 to facilitate the program. 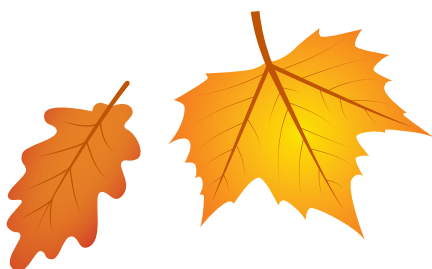
