

A Message from Rabbi Jacob Herber

"What is the secret to [the Jews'] immortality?" asked a very wise Mark Twain. How is it possible that we've managed to survive the turbulent rise and fall of empires and the countless attempts to destroy us? The answer to this query can be found in a single sentence in the Talmud: Rav Yehuda said that Rav Asi said that Rav said: It is prohibited to count money opposite a Hanukkah light. (Bavli, Shabbat 22a)

Among all of the rituals and rites of Hanukkah the Talmud offers us this specific warning. Our Sages want us to know that the lights of Hanukkah can be used for only one purpose: to commemorate the miracle of Hanukkah. If we were to count money, light a fire, or depend on the hanukkiah for heat, we could be questioned as to our motive behind our lighting the candles. The Talmud makes clear that we should not derive any benefit from either the light or the warmth of the Chanukah lights.

This rabbinic principle applies to all of the Mitzvot. We don't perform a mitzvah in order to benefit. While some commandments definitely have their side benefits, we shouldn't take them into account consider when perform them.

Elsewhere the Talmud recounts that Rabban Shimon ben Gamliel considered whether keeping kosher had any benefits, or if any of prohibited foods carried any risks. He taught, "A person should not say, 'I do not like pork'...instead one should say, 'I would like to have it, but God has decreed me not to partake."

On the one hand we're prohibited from considering the rewards of our commandments, on the other hand are there are hundreds of mitzvot (like lighting the hanukkiah) that - by definition - may not provide any benefit. It's normal for us to pray only when we feel prayerful, to give tzedakah only when we feel charitable, and to study only when we're feeling curious. If we don't feel like praying should we forego it? What happens if - for years - our faith remains in doubt?

In the same vein, if we only light our Chanukah candles because of their beauty, what happens when the beauty of the menorah no longer lasts? What happens when, after several days of lighting candles, we tire of the ritual all together? Only our sense of obligation can ensure that our tradition continues.

Our Sages and teachers believed that living a life of mitzvot will lead to a deep and meaningful connection with our traditions and with God. Our prayers become more meaningful, our texts become more enlightening, and our faith becomes stronger. What is the secret to the immortality of the Jewish People? It's out trust in the wisdom of our ancestors and our loyalty to our traditions regardless circumstance.

This year, as we light our hanukkiah, let's enjoy the beauty of the lights while also appreciating the meaning of what it actually means to perform the mitzvah of lighting of the candles.

In our confusing and contentious time, many in our Jewish community are seeking to find a greater sense of grounding in core values and ideas which can guide us, uplift us, and inspire us to become the best persons we can be. Mussar has been a part of our rich Jewish heritage since Biblical times. Over the millennia it has grown from a concept in the Hebrew Bible to a vast literature; from a Movement born in 19th century Europe which in our time has been uncovered and recovered as an authentic and living Jewish spiritual practice. In our learning we will explore Mussar as an authentic Jewish spiritual path for our times, and our lives.

Rabbi Gurvis facilitates Mussar groups throughout the Greater Boston area and in Western Massachusetts. Rabbi Gurvis is also a graduate of the Shalom Hartman Institute's Rabbinic Leadership Initiative and is a Senior Rabbinic Fellow of the Institute. Message From the President

Taking the Mystery out of the Board

A group of people are voted in at the Herzl-Ner Tamid Annual meeting. Their names show up in the HaKol and many other printed and on-line publications. You don't spend much time looking at the list except to scan it for names you recognize. "Oh, cool. So and so is on the Board." Of course, I'm talking about the Herzl-Ner Tamid Board of Directors.

So, what does the Board do? How does one get on the Board? Why is it important? I'm going to try to take some of the mystery out of it for those who haven't had the fortune of serving on the Board.

As spelled out in the HNT By-laws, the management and administration of the affairs of the Congregation are vested in its Board of Directors. The Board sets policy; it does not manage the clergy or staff running the daily operation. The responsibilities range from setting a strategic direction in line with fiduciary accountability – such as budgeting and controlling the assets of the Congregation - to establishing all professional staff positions defining duties, responsibilities and authority and establishing agreements covering their compensation and conditions of employment.

What's the makeup of the Board? The Executive Committee consists of the Officers – the President, Executive Vice President, Treasurer/ Financial Vice President, Membership Vice President, and Secretary – and the Immediate Past President. Officers are elected for one-year terms and cannot serve for longer than three consecutive terms. The Executive Committee closely monitors the operations of, and has general supervision over, the affairs of the Congregation. It evaluates congregational issues, does preliminary investigation, prioritizes, and brings to the Board subjects that need reporting, discussion, further work such as on committees or task forces, and Board approval. The Executive Committee must report its decisions and reasons for taking action to the Board on a timely basis.

The Rabbi and the Executive Director also attend monthly meetings of the Executive Committee and any ad hoc meetings providing





important input and typically bringing forth issues that affect policy or where some guidance is needed.

The Board of Directors consists of

- the Officers
- the Immediate Past President of the Congregation
- duly appointed representatives of the following: Women's League, the Ritual Committee, the Cemetery Committee, the Endowment Committee, and the Religious School Committee
- and ten elected members, five of whom are elected annually for overlapping terms of two years.

All 21 people have a vote with the exception of the President who votes in case of a tie. Chairs of other committees are invited to attend Board Meetings but are not considered Directors and do not have a vote.

In addition to their participation at monthly Board meetings, each Director holds a portfolio, typically where they have a strong interest or special skill. A portfolio may be in fundraising, outreach, youth programs, the Religious School, adult education, ritual functions or any ad hoc committee or task force the Board may designate from timeto-time.

How do you get on the Board? As defined in the by-laws, there is a Nominating Committee consisting of eight persons – the Immediate Past President as the chair, three members of the Board, and four members elected from the membership at large by the Congregation at the previous annual meeting. Members of the Nominating Committee cannot serve more than one year and cannot nominate someone from the committee to be a Director.

The Nominating Committee will seek out members from the Congregation at-large. There are really only two criteria:

 Demonstrating involvement in some area of synagogue participation. That could mean anything from regular services

attendance to active participation on the FRS parents committee.

 Having needed skills. The Board works best with a mix of people from different backgrounds and skillsets. Real estate and building experts. Lawyers and doctors. Business professionals and those involved in local government. Parents of youth who understand the religious school needs. People with strong marketing and communication skills.

A Message from Director of Education Dr. Eliyahu Krigel, CJE



A Dvar

"And Moses stretched out his hand over the sea; and God caused the sea to go back by a strong east wind all night, and made the sea dry land, and the waters were divided."

Exodus 14:21

There are many layers of commentary on this important verse in the Torah from the book of Exodus. Two sources from the Talmud describe what happened at the sea. The first version asserts eagerness on behalf of the leaders to enter the sea and escape the ensuing Egyptians. In Sotah, chapter seven, the Talmud says, "Rabbi Meir said: 'when the Israelites were standing at the Sea, the tribes were arguing with one another. One said I will go into the sea first; the other said I will go first. So, the tribe of Benjamin jumped into the Sea..." Later on, in the second version, the text continues, "Rabbi Yehuda says: 'It didn't happen this way. It happened that one said, "I am not going first," and the other said, "I am not going first." (Until finally) Nachshon jumped into the Sea first." The marvelous aspect about the Talmud is that both opinions were included so as to give a choice of views regarding the events of the parting and eventual journey to Israel.

When it's time to take out the trash, who steps forward in your house to accomplish the task? Is your household similar to Rabbi Meir's version? Are your kids all arguing to determine who can take out the trash? Or is your household more like mine, when various family members step forward at unique times to follow through, like Nachshon? By utilizing the commentaries as models for living

healthy in a Jewish context, each version encourages leadership by taking responsibility in a different way to make sure things get accomplished! Nachshon, who was the first person to enter the sea before it parted in the second interpretation, speaks to my experience of raising kids. In this scenario, the sea splits only when Nachshon is up to his head in water. It takes a brave leader like Nachshon to fully submerge into the water based on the principle of Emunah (faith) for the passage of freedom to begin.

The Piezetzner Rebbe once posed the question, "Where is God?" This great Hassidic master answered by commenting, "God is where you let God in." When we make room, metaphorically, in our relationship with something greater than just ourselves, we are making the rituals kadosh (holy or distinct). Whether we relate Jewish parenting to Rabbi Meir's account or the story of Nachshon, the journey is full of sacrificing and compromising. If we don't let holiness into the parenting process, we run the risk of takings things for granted. May we all continue to be positive role models for our children and community and have a safe and joyful secular new year!


