A Message from Rabbi Jacob Herber

Genesis 12 begins with words which are some of the most famous found in the Torah: "God said to Abram, "[*Lekh Lekha*] Go forth from your land, from your birthplace, and from your father's house."" The verse begs the question, why does God mention three distinct places when God commands Abram to go forth? Wouldn't simply referring to one have been enough? Over the centuries our sages and commentators have sought to make sense of the threefold repetition: "From your land, from your birthplace, and from your father's house."

Some of those commentators believe that each descriptive refers to a single location and that the repetition is intended for emphasis. But it's possible that these three place references aren't just referring to one place but, instead, three. God is suggesting to Abraham three important ideas, that he can't stay where he is, that he can't go back to where he was born, and that he can't go to the land of his native people. Essentially, Abraham has only one place to go, to a new home.

National Refugee Shabbat is an event organized and sponsored by HIAS, the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society, to highlight the plight of the 100 million people worldwide who have been forcibly displaced from their homes due to persecution and violence.

Of that 100 million – which is 13 times the population of Washington State – over 60% are displaced but still

living within the borders of their country. However, 25.4 million elders, adults, and children, are refugees, who have been forced to flee "from their land, from their birthplace, and from their father's house" to find safety in a different country.

The Kenyan poet Worson Shire born to Somali parents, who eventually found their way to England, captures the heartbreak behind uprooting one's life and family. She writes:

no one leaves home unless

home is the mouth of a shark

you only run for the border

when you see the whole city running as well....

you have to understand,

that no one puts their children in a boat unless the water is safer than the land no one leaves home until home is a sweaty voice in your ear saying leave, run away from me now i don't know what i've become but i know that anywhere is safer than here





For the 24 million refugees, that is adults, elders, and children, who have been forced to flee their home country due to persecution because of their race, religion, gender, sexuality, nationality, or political opinion – there are three options for finding, safety, stability, and building a better life for their children: repatriation to their homeland, integration into the country into which they've sought refuge (usually one which borders their own country), and resettlement for those most vulnerable and unable to remain safe in their homeland.

There are things we can do to help. I urge you to join us for Shabbat morning services on Saturday, February 11th for National Refugee Shabbat. Dina Burstein, Board Chair of the Jewish Coalition for Immigrant Justice NW and other members of JCIJ will share how their Jewish values and family stories inspire them to advocate on behalf of immigrants and refugees in our community. They will also share with us how we can do our part to make life better immigrants and refugees in our area.

The Torah refers to Abraham as Avram HaIvri, literally, "Abram the one who crosses over." Abram grows into a moral leader because he has the experience of leaving his home and settling into a new land. In rabbinic tradition he's exemplifies loving-kindness, welcoming strangers, and fighting for justice.

Even if we don't have the experience of going forth from our land, our birthplace, and our father's house, we can still have compassion for those in our tradition and those in the present who take that journey. And we can act to help them by following the moral example of Abraham, who welcomed in those in need of shelter and fought to create a more just world.

Message From the President

Never Again!

L ast Friday, January 27th, was the 78th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz concentration camp. It seems so long ago ... yet it wasn't. We all have personal stories that make the Holocaust very real to us. I have a couple I'd like to share:

The 50th anniversary year of the liberation was 1995. I found myself in Stuttgart, Germany negotiating with a small software company, Heiler Software. Talks weren't starting until Monday, so I had free time Sunday morning. Being in a nice suburb, I decided to take a relaxing walk down a very charming cobblestone street. The streets were empty except for a few elderly couples strolling to church. I looked at each of these well-dressed, pleasant looking people and realized that, in the 1940s, they were very likely in the Hitler Youth or guards or the gestapo or, hopefully, "just" members of the Nazi party or soldiers in the Nazi army.

It didn't really matter to me; I became totally unnerved. 50+ years earlier, I wouldn't be leisurely walking these streets. I would most likely have been dragged out of my home, stripped of my possessions, herded onto a cattle car, and shipped off to a Concentration Camp ... where I most likely would have been murdered. I had to get off these streets; I wanted to get back to the safety of the United States as quickly as possible ... a luxury our families and fellow Jews didn't have.

The second story is one to which most of us can relate. About 15 years ago, my older brother Rob and our cousin decided to put together a family tree starting with my Mother's parents, Sol and Pearl Schayer who were from the Ukraine and Austria, respectively. Like many Jews, they left the old country in the early 1910s. They met and married in Chicago in 1918. The family tree from these

two individuals exceeds 300 people today. We 300 were lucky. Sol and Pearl had the courage, foresight, family support, and the luck to successfully leave Europe and start a new life.

Pearl's entire family, the Kramer family - her parents and six brothers and sisters, all migrated to the U.S. during that time. Besides the large extended family of Sol and Pearl of over 300 people, the other Kramers have their own large extended families with successful professionals spread throughout the world. But then I look at the family tree on Sol's side. There's Malka and Aaron, two of Sol's siblings who migrated with Sol to the U.S. Then there's the box that just says 9 deceased, the nine other brothers and sisters of Sol along with his parents, Abe and Goldie, who were slaughtered in the Holocaust. Unfortunately and ironically, the nine brothers and sisters are just a number; we don't even have their names.

I think about these stories on Holocaust Remembrance Day and other times throughout the year. I think about the families that never had the opportunity to grow to 300+ people from a single married couple. Each of us has our own stories, some with joy and many with sadness. Incredible journeys, tragic tales, and mysteries. These are the stories we must continue to pass down through our children and other family members. With the rise in antisemitism in the U.S. and across the globe, being proactive becomes even more important. This is why we have a day every year ... to remember:

Never forget. Never let others forget. Never again!

A Message from Director of Education Dr. Eliyahu Krigel, CJE



The Gwenn and Dean Polik and Valerie Polack z"l Israel Trip 2023 February 15-26, 2023 • The Masa Program at HNT

In February high school students from HNT will have the incredible opportunity to travel to Israel on a ten-day impact travel experience. When I began working at HNT in 2015 one of the major issues we faced was post b'nai mitzvah drop out and disengagement. We worked together to create the Masa Program at HNT to provide a meaningful opportunity for post b'nai mitzvah engagement. During Covid we postponed the Israel trip and continued meetings on Zoom. The group has been meeting regularly to prepare for a transformational experience in Israel planned and coordinated with Ramah Israel. Riding a camel, hiking Masada, swimming in the Dead Sea, eating a traditional Bedouin meal, praying at the Kotel, remembering our past at Yad Vashem, Herzl National Cemetery, and Ammunition Hill, exploring the biblical landscape reserve at Neot Kedumin, and learning from a Jewish mystic in Jerusalem from the Shalev Center and glass blower in Safed are among our many planned activities.

Students in 8th – 12th grade have a variety of ways to continue their learning and involvement at HNT after their b'nai mitzvah is complete. One of the central goals of HNT is to build a strong sense of community in our teenagers, creating a close connection to each other, to Judaism, and to HNT. In addition to USY and being a teaching assistant in the classroom, our robust travel impact program helps foster meaningful engagement and participation for this age group. To help meet the goal of providing programming for this target age group after the b'nai mitzvah experience, we planned a series of 5 trips on a five-year rotation called the Masa Program with the following goals:

- Broadening the Jewish experiences and deepening the Jewish knowledge of our teens in a compelling and attractive way,
- Connecting our teens with each other and with the greater Jewish people,


 Bonding our students with HNT as their home and community, the place they can turn for friendship, exciting new ideas, and an anchor for helping them make ethical decisions at a critical time in their personal development.

HNT students have now traveled to New York City to learn about the Jewish immigration experience. The Los Angeles trip explored how we as Jewish individuals and as a community tell our unique story in the media. We traveled to Washington, D.C., and Philadelphia on a trip to explore Jewish political advocacy. The Selma, Alabama and Orlando, Florida trip was focused on the Jewish connection with the Civil Rights Movement of the 1960's. Each trip has a class component where students meet and prepare for the travel experience. Pictures of our trips are up in the HNT main hallway across from the HNT office to learn more. Our upcoming trip to Israel in February will mark a complete rotation of five trips within this successful program. To help us prepare for this journey, the students have been engaged in a monthly series of workshops and classes at HNT and on Zoom for the past two years. Our great appreciation and thanks goes out to Gwenn and Dean Polik for believing in the vision of this program. Thank you so much to the HNT leadership, clergy, parents, and students for all the support! Follow us on our journey by going to Frankel Religious School on Facebook.
