A Message from Rabbi Jacob Herber



Rabbi Jacob Herber

It's perhaps *bashert*, meant to be, that we journey through *Sefer Bemidbar*, the Book of Numbers, during months of Summer. This book of the Torah recounts the Israelites' trek through the wilderness of Sinai at a time when many of us in America are pursuing our vacation journeys. As I've taught many times, our Sages in the Midrash ask why the Torah was given in the desert and not populous, developed setting like a city. They tell us that "one must make oneself ownerless like the desert in order to receive the wisdom of Torah." (*Bemidbar Rabbah* 1:7). When we leave what is known behind, when we untether ourselves to work and the daily grind of our schedule, we are more available for and open to reflection and wisdom.

What better time than now to take advantage of a slightly slower, less frenetic pace of life to make room for those activities and pursuits that can broaden our perspective and enrich our souls. Now is the time for that guilt-free walk or hike with a friend or that interesting podcast. Read that book at the beach or the pool that broadens your thinking or lifts your spirit. Come to shul and open your heart in prayer while feeling a part of a community.

Do that thing that you've felt unable to do during the year. It will help your and your spirit feel stronger. Summer is a time for spirituality and reflection so that we can enter a new year with new ideas about who we are and who we want to aspire to be. It's important for all of us to make what time we can to walk in the wilderness and receive the wisdom that's out there but, until now been, inaccessible.

Torah is only truly available to us if we make room for it in our lives. During Winter that can be a daunting endeavor because the days are short and work, school, commitments, and responsibilities are long. Hopefully during the summer, we can free ourselves from secular burdens just enough to turn toward the spiritual. Let's take things a little more slowly and spend a bit more time outside. Let's push ourselves a little less hard in pursuit of success and goals. Perhaps we can move our lives - if even it's just for few weeks - a little closer to the wilderness to make ourselves open for reflection, revelation, and Torah.

Introduction to Mussar - Starting on Sept 14



Message From the President

Reflections on the Past Year

It was the Best of Times. It was the Worst of Times. My first year as President of HNT was to say the least challenging. I've been in leadership positions before. I was even a CEO for several years where we built products, sold them, and actually made money. This past year I've learned a synagogue is a very different entity and much more complex.

Like other synagogues or places of worship, you often hear HNT referred to as a village ... a community. It's actually true ... and not just because it's a place where you have relationships with others. I've discovered that, much like a village, synagogue life is multi-faceted. There are scores of groups, activities, and events that make up synagogue life. You can be part of one or many, but except for the high holidays, you are only exposed to a small percentage of the entire village.

There's the core – the congregants who regularly attend morning minyan, Friday night services, and Saturday morning services. A few attend all but usually it's different groups. The religious school is an entity unto itself. The kids are with their friends and their teachers as they take the multi-year journey to prepare for their b'nai mitzvah and the foundation for a Jewish life. Just like in secular school, the kids' parents become connected with each other. Then there are other concentrations of activities - Day-Timers, Adult education classes, Women's League, Social Action Committee, Mitzvah Corps, Affinity Groups, special young family events like Tot Shabbat, the newly formed HNT softball team and many more. Of course, the holiday celebrations like Chanukah and the Purim Shpiel bring different groups of congregants together as well. There are many ways people are involved and

connect with others with HNT as the core.

When you're engaged at HNT, you understand one area and one aspect of the synagogue. The more you're involved, the more connections you have. But only in this past year have I gained a real appreciation for just how many different ways our synagogue connects people and integrates into their everyday life.

On reflection, we are all participants in the synagogue for two primary reasons:

- **Community.** We like the activities, but it's really a reason to be with other people that have similar values and with whom we enjoy spending time and
- **Spirituality.** We need and enjoy the prayers and spirituality that Jewish life and values bring led by our Rabbi and other professional clergy and staff.

Shifting gears to looking at this past year ... it has been challenging. We returned to being in-person after dealing with several years of the pandemic. But the world has changed in the way it functions. Workers who worked remotely are reluctant to return to the office. We, at HNT, are experiencing the same dynamic. It's a time of transition and HNT needs to reinvent itself – embracing many of the traditions that has made HNT special but introducing new elements to adapt to our changing lifestyles and membership demographics.

Key members of the HNT family are no longer with us on staff - Rebecca Frankel, Dr. Eliyahu Krigel, and our beloved Cantor Bradlee Kurland. We've added

some special people. Josh Niehaus joined us bringing a unique connection to not only the young families who knew him from Schechter and his many other community activities but the entire congregation through his music and engaging style. Irit Levin joined as the interim Head of School and has already instilled leadership and important communication to FRS. Despite outstanding effort by the Assistant Rabbi Search Committee, we were unable to hire the right fit for HNT. But that has opened up great possibilities. With significant functional needs - clergy assistance for Rabbi Herber, permanent leadership in the religious school, and cantorial support – we have the exciting opportunity as a community to think through our needs and hire the right people to prepare us for the future.

I know that uncertainty and change make people uncomfortable. But from my perch ... looking at all facets of our synagogue ... with the evolution of the Conservative movement and the changing demographics fueled by the lifestyle changes of the pandemic, the timing is right for all these changes to take place at HNT.

This next year our focus, beyond all the traditional activities, is on three areas. You'll learn more in the weeks/months to come, but here is a short synopsis:

1. Engagement. Rabbi Herber, Ilene Sloan, and Susan Edelheit are leading an immediate effort to make HNT more the center of activity. They created three working groups: **3rd Space** led by Jenn Rosenwald to make HNT more visibly attractive, welcoming

and a place to congregate, **Membership** led by Aurora Bearsse to support our current members (in conjunction with the Membership Committee) and attract new members, and **Communications** led by Lindsay O'Neill to improve our internal membership communication and community-wide exposure.

2. Infrastructure. As discussed earlier, hiring the right people to support the congregation's spiritual needs and activities.

3. Barnabie Point. Spearheaded by Audrey Covner, the Barnabie Point property has achieved important Mercer Island approvals. The prospect of having a new building partnering with other Jewish organizations is finally close to reality. The potential is limitless. The entire congregation will, of course, be included in the process and the decision making. But that means a lot of thought and work by many needs to take place during this next year to work out details.

It has been a privilege to serve as President this past year. Frankly, at times, it has also been incredibly challenging. But that comes with the territory. I look forward to the synagogue making important strides this year and appreciate everyone's patience and support in getting HNT to be the synagogue we want it to be.







Jewish Community Relations Council



Jewish Community Relations Councils (JCRCs) were initially established in 1944 to rectify the lack of a united voice in the American Jewish response to the Holocaust. A JCRC represents the organized Jewish community to the broader community, advancing core Jewish interests by building bridges and relationships with ethnic and religious leaders, public officials, labor, LGBTQ and other community leaders, media, and school officials, and by educating and advocating on issues that represent the consensus view of our diverse Jewish community. There are currently about 120 JCRCs across the country.

Seattle had a JCRC for many years. Like other Federations, where 90% of the JCRCs reside, Seattle's Federation shifted from a focus on external threats to internal community issues (low affiliation rates, high intermarriage, Jewish education, etc.) and disbanded its JCRC. That focus has changed again in recent years with the rise of antisemitism and challenges facing Israel in the world community. Three years ago, the Seattle Federation reestablished the JCRC with Max Patashnik as its Director. 35 Jewish organizations in the Puget Sound Area have joined as members of the council.

HNT is well-represented on the Council. Susan Edelheit was HNT's "delegate" on the Council since its inception and did a superb job of representing HNT and bringing issues to the Board for discussion and resolution. Susan's term is up, and Ellie Halevy has agreed to step in as the new HNT representative. Rabbi Rosenbaum served three years on the JCRC Board as chair of the Intergroup Relations Committee and continues to serve on that committee. We are also thrilled that Audrey Covner was named the new Chair of the JCRC bringing her proven leadership skills and countless ideas to the Council. Thank you to Audrey, Susan, Rabbi Rosenbaum and Ellie for leading and ensuring HNT's voice is heard and listened to in the greater Jewish Community.



Social Action Shout Outs



Tikkun Olam Is Alive and Well at HNT: Our Impact in 2022-2023

Thanks to your generosity & helping hands, HNT made a BIG impact in 2022-2023.

Let's step up our Social Action efforts again this year!

- **Fill a Backpack for Leschi Elementary School kids in Need:**
We collected 78 backpacks filled with school supplies for children in need.
- **JFS Food Drive and Sort:** HNT donated 61 bags of food and toiletries to JFS Polack Food Bank
- **Meals for the Homeless:** HNT provided 1,188 homeless shelter meals for teens, women, and men.
- **Refugee Household item Collection:**
We collected new household items (bedding, dishes, linens) for 14 refugee families being settled in Seattle by JFS.
- **Winter Coat Drive for Leschi Elementary & ROOTS Shelter (young adults):**
We collected 116 coats and 23 other warm clothing items for elementary school students and young adults in need.
- **Tutoring Leschi Elementary Kids in Need:**
Four fantastic volunteers provided 70 sessions (60-90 minutes each) of reading and math tutoring for students in need.
- **Volunteering at Birthday Dreams on Martin Luther King Day of Service:**
Sixteen parents and kids from FRS created a birthday party experience for children in need by making party games, wrapping presents, and by assembling and donating 100 mitzvah (goodie) bags.
- **Mary's Place Book Drive:** In honor of Lorna & David Isenberg, HNT donated 172 books to Mary's Place Homeless Shelter for families in need.
- **SummeRun & Walk for Ovarian Cancer, July 17:** Herzl raised \$11,368 for ovarian cancer research & education.



A Message from Interim Head of School Irit Eliav Levin



One of my favorite children's stories is called "A Mountain of Blintzes" by Barbara Diamond Goldin. It tells the story of Sarah and Max and their five children. Though they are hard workers, they never seemed to have enough. So when it comes time to celebrate Shavuot, they hatch a plan to each work a little extra so they can purchase the ingredients to make blintzes for the holiday. But each night, when the time comes to add their extra earnings to the coin box, Sarah and Max each rationalize that they need their coins more and tuck them away. When the time comes to open the box to purchase their supplies, the coin box is empty! Luckily for the family, the children had followed their parents' examples and each took on a little work after school as well. Their payment came in the form of flour, sugar, cottage cheese, and sour cream - the ingredients they would need for their blintzes!

Though it is a Shavuot story, my children love reading it year round. After reading it to them the other night, it struck me how much synagogue life can feel like Sarah and Max's family. Sometimes, it can be easy to believe that someone else will volunteer for that committee or make that contribution. But as Sarah and Max learned, we only get out of anything what we put into it.

Their children are my inspiration. They saw a specific need and each found their own way to contribute to it. I see this happen constantly in synagogue life. Members who love books give hours to maintain and develop our synagogue library. Parents of young kids volunteer to create meaningful Jewish experiences for our community as a whole. Congregants blessed with a gift for numbers volunteer to help

our wonderful staff keep our finances in order.

It even comes out in small, everyday moments. We've had some lovely Shabbat services at the waterfront this summer. I've seen parents making sure all the children around them, not just their own, have their food and drinks ready before getting food for themselves. I watched five year olds pushing three year olds on the swings to make sure they were having fun. I was grateful to another parent who noticed that my three year old had gotten stuck in the gaga pit (those walls were SO tall for him!) and helped him out before I could get there.

We are rapidly approaching the month of Elul, a time when we are encouraged to be introspective in preparation for the holy work of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. As you do so, I encourage you to think about how you can bring your own unique skills and resources to HNT. Are you good with kids? Maybe you can be a volunteer in a Religious School classroom. Do you enjoy organizing things? Our Religious School classrooms could definitely use a refresh! Have you been blessed with "a little extra" in terms of financial resources? Our synagogue staff and leadership are filled with ideas and dreams you could help make come true!

This is our community. Let's all chip in however we can to help make it stronger. And a mountain of good things are likely to follow!
