In the Talmud (Shabbat 21b), we learn of the debate between Hillel and Shammai. **Beit Shammai says:** On **the first day one kindles eight** lights and, from **there on, gradually decreases** the number of lights until, on the last day of Hanukkah, they kindle one light. **And Beit Hillel says:** On **the first day one kindles one** light, and from **there on, gradually increases** the number of lights until, on the last day, they kindle eight lights.**The reason** for Beit Hillel's opinion is that the number of lights is based on the principle:

One elevates to a higher level in matters of sanctity and one does not downgrade. In other words, we should always aim to bring more light into the world. Let it be so.

A Message from **Rabbi Jacob Herber**



This year Hanukkah begins on December 7th. According to Halakhah, Jewish law, it's not enough to simply light the candles. We need to illuminate them in a public place to fulfill the commandment of *Pirsum HaNes*, publicizing the miracle of the oil burning for eight days. More than any other holiday on the Jewish calendar, Hanukkah is supposed to be a public celebration. The Talmud states, "It is a mitzvah to place the Hanukkah lamp at the entrance to one's house on the outside, so that all can see it. If one lives upstairs, one should place it by the window adjacent to the public domain. In a time of danger, one places it on the table and that is sufficient to fulfill one's obligation."


I never hesitate to place my *hanukkiah*, Hanukkah menorah, in the window. Even as antisemitism was on the rise, we continued to fulfill the mitzvah of *Pirsum HaNes*. Many of us have grown up in the shadow of the Holocaust. Our parents or grandparents or other relative may be a Survivor and hesitant about publicly identifying themselves as Jews out of a real fear of harassment. But now things have changed, and it seems like overnight. Since October 7th the number of antisemitic acts has skyrocketed here in America and abroad. It's become apparent to many of us – especially Jewish students on college campuses – that we're living in a "time of danger" when we should be careful about publicizing our Jewish identity. And yet, I think that the response to the ripping down of posters bearing the faces of Israeli hostages and the hateful and violent rhetoric of pro-Hamas demonstrators is *davka*, precisely, to place the *hanukkiah* in our window. We oppose hatred and bigotry, and we will not hide in the shadows and tremble before the antisemites. It's time for us to say, this is still America – and such behavior and acts are not acceptable in this country.

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So, I'm asking you to place your *hanukkiah* in the window. During the eight nights of Hanukkah, place the menorah where people can see it. Take a photo and post it on social media. Let people know why you are doing it.

I remember a Hanukkah story from Billings Montana in 1993. After a Jew hater threw a brick through the window of a Jewish home on the eve of Hanukkah, everyone in the neighborhood placed a *hanukkiah* in their window — it was a way of saying — hatred isn't acceptable. And there are still many non-Jews in our country who feel this way. We won't cower in the face of the hate that we face.

So, place your *hanukkiah* in the window. "Put on your *kippah… it's time to celebrate Hanukkah*."

HNT Goes To Washington DC



n Tuesday, November 14th, I experienced one of those "once-in-a-lifetime moments." My wife and I, along with numerous other HNT members, flew to Washington DC, to show support for Israel and celebrate being Jewish on the National Mall alongside nearly 300,000 other people. Politicians from both parties took to the stage to declare their unwavering support. In one unforgettable moment, Chuck Schumer, Mike Johnson, Hakeem Jeffries, and Joni Ernst held hands above their heads as we all cheered "Am Yisrael Chai." Jewish celebrities and community leaders thanked us for showing up. They reminded us that Jewish and American values are under assault all over our great nation, and we need to show the same level of support back in our home communities. Jewish artists from Israel and America sang songs of resilience, peace, faith, and love. We all stood shoulder to shoulder as we sang HaTikvah in front of the US Capitol Building. It was so emotional that Omer Adam's voice cracked, and the crowd took over, singing with all the ruach of a people traumatized by generations of war and persecution. If we hadn't been packed in so tightly together, I believe many people would have collapsed under the weight of that moment. But we were there for each other, emotionally and physically, and I have never felt so connected to people I had just met (other than that time at Sinai!). In fact, the woman next to me had brought her seven-yearold, and he spent much of the rally on various people's shoulders so he could see. (See picture below).



Another highlight came as we were boarding the plane. Stephanie Shujman and Andrea Gamoran were standing right before us on the jetway. In front of them stood Will Quantz. And who should walk up behind us? Ellie Kalman and Ilyse Wagner. Seven HNT members were standing in a row! I know other HNT members attended as well. I looked around the plane and recognized people from other synagogues, camps, day schools, etc. It was a Jewish reunion in the sky! The flight attendants inquired about what was going on, and they were given blue ribbons to wear, which they proudly donned for the remainder of the flight. The pilot even posed for pictures with Steph and Andrea. (See photo above)

That incredible feeling helped me feel less alone than I have since I witnessed the tragic events of October 7th and the rise of antisemitism that followed. Antisemitism which, once again, hit home on November 22nd, when our building was desecrated. It was heart-wrenching to show up to work and witness the gallons of paint that had been sprayed across our house of worship and to read the hate speech that was sprawled across the front of the building, from the ground up to the roof.

But, just like in DC, I witnessed people rush to help. Once the police had collected what they needed and we had taken all the photos necessary to document this barbaric act so we never forget, we rolled up our sleeves and got to work, just like Jewish people all over the world have been doing for thousands of years. It's fitting that we are about to celebrate Hanukkah, a holiday all about restoring the Temple. And, just like the Maccabees, we may be small in numbers, but we have an abundance of koach (strength).

I am so grateful that I live in a country that allows me to celebrate being Jewish and my love for Israel on the National Mall. I'm so appreciative of our local law enforcement, politicians, and community members who show up in our time of need. And I'm so glad to be a part of a community that celebrates being Jewish, in the hard times and the good.

HNT Goes To Washington DC



My experience at the Israel Rally in Washington DC - by Ilyse Wagner

- There were over 290,000 at the March and another 250,000 watching online. Being part of something so monumental was beyond words.
- 2. The mood was good. There was so much energy. We formed a community. I met the people standing around me and had wonderful conversations.
- Over 200,000 of us sang the Israeli national anthem, Hatikvah (the Hebrew word for hope), together. What other group of people knows all the words to another country's national anthem, and in another language no less.
- 4. There was a lot of focus on the hostages. People held signs of the hostages, we heard from family members of hostages (truly heartbreaking), and we chanted "Bring Them Home" repeatedly. As I've said here before, I don't know why this isn't getting more attention. Hopefully we made a difference.
- 5. The speakers and crowd spoke out against Hamas, but everyone showed compassion for the Israelis and the Palestinians who are also victims of Hammas.
- There were tens of thousands of students there, including several who spoke as part of the program. It felt good seeing this against the backdrop of antisemitism that's rampant on college campuses right now.
- The crowd was made up of all flavors of Jews religious, cultural, and everything in between, as well as non-Jews. Everyone showed great respect for one another. We were all one. Am Yisrael Chai.

- 8. It was amazing to hear from Natan Sharansky who many of us heard from at the Rally for Soviet Jewry on the mall back in 1987, shortly after he was released from prison. As he began to speak, we all looked at one another and shared if we were there in 1987 (I was). I still remember how powerful that day was which was part of why I knew I had to be part of this.
- 9. I have never been so proud to be Jewish. After weeks of wondering whether to wear my Jewish star necklace (I continue to wear it, but I do tuck it under my shirt sometimes), I walked proudly through the DC airport with a shirt that read "I Stand with Israel" amongst crowds of people in similar shirts, many of whom were wearing kippot (yalmulkes).

I hope for the elimination of terrorist organizations, an end to antisemitism, and peace in the Middle East! I will continue to march until this is realized.

Message From the President Behind the Scenes



We have all seen the despicable graffiti that was put on our synagogue. The scene that Wednesday morning was not pretty. Word got out quickly. There were Congregants who came to see if they could help. Neighbors popped in. Everyone was taking pictures which spread quickly throughout the world on social media. And, of course, there was the press. It is their job to sniff out news, and they are good at it.

Merav Canaan, our Executive Director, contacted the Mercer Island Police and SafeWashington immediately – who contacted the FBI. The Mercer Island police arrived at HNT quickly and controlled the scene. All people – congregants, neighbors, press, and others – were moved to a safe distance away from the scene. The parking lot was blocked, and entrance was limited to those who had to be at HNT.

Rabbi Herber, Merav, Ilene Sloan – HNT's Executive VP and liaison to the Security & Safety Committee, and David Berkman – Chair of the Security & Safety Committee, were all on-site within the hour strategizing on necessary steps, both large and small.

One of the steps was communication. The HNT community needed to get the facts as quickly as possible. We immediately emailed the Board to update them on what happened, and then sent a communication to the entire congregation, many of whom were already aware of the vandalism. All emails to the entire congregation are sent out in batches through ShulCloud so it takes a couple of hours to fully disseminate. Everyone should have received an email by mid-afternoon.

What I want to address is communication to the world outside of HNT, our decision and the thinking that went into that decision.

As background and what also factored into our thinking was the previous day's activity. Herzl-Ner Tamid was part of a TV news story on Tuesday that erroneously implied we were the recipient of a suspicious package and showed our building, parking lot, and synagogue name on TV. That night the vandalism took place.

As we're sitting in the Rabbi's office working on tens of action items the next morning, texts and calls started coming in with requests for press interviews. Anyone with a connection to the media was contacted – past HNT presidents, well-connected congregants, and HNT members in the media. And they, of course, forwarded them to Rabbi, llene, Merav, and me. During the meeting, my wife Cathy called and said "a TV Station called and wants an interview with you. What should I do?" Others were getting similar requests as we sat in the meeting as you could hear the beeps of the phones going off. The requests weren't just local, but worldwide. Good meaning congregants were even volunteering to help set up a press conference, if desired.

So, what should we do? Do we make a statement? Do we set up a Press Conference? Do we have individual interviews? If we communicate, there has to be a single, consistent message. When slapped in the face, you want to fight back. But, in this situation, I can't act as Mickey and respond with my natural instincts; I have to act as President of HNT. The same for Rabbi Herber. You can't react. You have to sit back and listen to professionals who have been through this before, weigh the options, and then decide.

The professional advice, from a security standpoint, was to keep as low a profile as possible. Do not draw attention to HNT because it puts people in the building and the building itself at great risk. The professional advice, from a media-savvy standpoint, was to use this act as an opportunity to denounce hate. Show the world that people need to stand up against these acts of cowardice.

After significant discussion, we chose the conservative approach that would best protect the people of our synagogue. We considered the previous day's press and the inability to control the narrative with the media, the high-level of antisemitism acts across the country, and the fervor of uneducated people using the Israeli-Hamas war as a justification for violence. No official statement was made by an HNT spokesperson, typically being the Rabbi or the synagogue president.

The only public declaration made was a short general statement on our Facebook page which some media outlets picked up. I actually saw several newscasts with the words from our Facebook page across the screen accompanied by several of our graffiti pictures found on other social media outlets.

We relied instead on third parties like the Federation, JCRC, ADL, local Rabbis and other clergy, and local politicians to make statements against the act and against hate. The focus was on the people or organizations who made the statements and the actual act of vandalism. The act remained alive but the HNT name quickly dissipated from media channels as it was no longer news. Did we miss an opportunity, as the actual victim, to publicly denounce hatred and those who would commit such an act? Absolutely. That was the tradeoff and the downside to the decision.

I've talked to many people days after the act when people had a fresh perspective. And nothing changed. I heard many telling me loud and clear and sometimes angrily that we missed an opportunity. And I heard many just as loud saying that it was the right decision minimizing the future risk to HNT and its congregants.

Hopefully, we will not have the opportunity to make such a decision again.


Legal and Governance Committee

Re-Thinking Social Justice in an Age of Moral Confusion

Taught by Rabbi Jay Rosenbaum

Nearly every synagogue in America has a Social Action Committee. That implies there are universal standards of social justice. But the recent inability of so many civic and religious leaders to unequivocally condemn the brutal attack on Israel civilians on October 7 suggests otherwise, that we are living in a state of moral confusion. In this class, we will explore:

- Why are the words 'tikkun olam' inadequate to describe the Jewish approach to social justice?
- Why have some Jews suggested that our very definition of social justice is politically motivated?
- Are we sure we know what social justice is? Are the solutions to homelessness, racial inequality, crime and punishment and immigration policy simply a matter of choosing right from wrong? Or do they require nuanced conversation? If the latter, why aren't we having these conversations in Jewish settings?
- How can we know the difference between what is simply right or wrong and what is morally complex?
- How should we respond when victims of injustice treat us unjustly?
- How might the recent attack on Israel lead to a fundamental re-thinking of how the Jewish community understands and 'does' social justice?

A Message from Interim Head of School **Irit Eliav Levin**

"For there is always light, if only we're brave enough to see it. If only we're brave enough to be it."

- Amanda Gorman, National Youth Poet Laureate

It is no coincidence that so many holidays that occur in these cold, dark winter months contain within them messages and images of light. Our own tradition of Hanukkah is no exception, indeed it is often called the Festival of Lights.

But the lights don't just simply appear. Yes, there was a miracle when a jar of oil that should have been only enough for one day somehow lasted for eight days. But like other places in our tradition, the miracle only happened after action on our part. The Maccabees, a small group, bravely fought against Antiochus and his giant army.

When they won the battle, they could have spent their time partying or going home to their families. Instead, one of their first orders of business was to return to the Temple, to rededicate it so that it could once again be used for worship. The word Hanukkah actually means dedication in honor of this action. The menorah they were lighting is often interpreted as the Ner Tamid, the eternal flame that symbolizes God and therefore should never be extinguished. Some historians believe that they were actually returning to celebrate Sukkot, since they had missed the harvest festival while fighting. (This might explain why Hanukkah is also eight days long).

As a Jewish people, we are a small group, once again fighting to preserve our traditions, our people, and our

homeland. We are fighting both the war in Gaza and the simultaneous battles against antisemitism around the world; and unfortunately, even to protect our own synagogue from the vandalism that we recently experienced.

I recently had the privilege of attending an ADL webinar, where the guest speaker was Rabbi David Wolpe. He said something on the webinar which I found incredibly powerful. He argued that the best way you can respond to people hating Jews is by being Jewish. In the face of antisemitism, the best thing you can do is join a synagogue.

Our tradition teaches that miracles don't just happen, we have to help make them happen. From the large scale actions, like nearly 300,000 Jews and allies gathering together in D.C. to rally in support of Israel, to the smaller ones like showing up to HNT for Religious School or Shabbat services or even our annual Hanukkah Party - we can be the light that shines into the darkness of these times. It is time to rededicate ourselves to our community, our homeland, and our tradition. And together, we can bring light and create miracles.
