A Message from Rabbi Jacob Herber



ertain events are so monumental that they're known by the shorthand of the date they occurred —December 7, September 11, October 7. I don't know whether April 13 will stick, but, in my thinking, it belongs in this same category.

April 13, 2024, will be remembered as the day that the war between Iran and Israel came out of the shadows and assumed its place at center stage. On that day, a barrage of more than 300 drones, cruise missiles, and rockets was fired from Iranian soil into Israeli territory.

In Israel, the attack came in the night, after Shabbat, and lit up the skies as a mighty array of defensive weapons intercepted 99% of the Iranian missiles. Though the nature and scope of the attack was shocking and unnerving, it was not, ultimately, harmful to Israel. Minor damage was caused to an Israeli Air Force base in the Negev, and, sadly, a Bedouin girl was injured by shrapnel from an intercepted rocket.

We can only speculate about Iran's actual intentions. Some claim that Iran meant to do real harm but failed. Others say the attack was an exercise meant to serve as a warning that Iran would not stand by while Israel attacks its military leaders in Syria and Lebanon. Some cavalierly and foolishly called it a fireworks display.

The attack may have been thwarted, but was serious nonetheless, for several reasons. First, it could easily have been much worse. Iran could have launched thousands rather than hundreds of rockets that likely would have overwhelmed Israel's defenses. Second, Iran could have incited Hezbollah to unleash some of the more than 150,000 rockets it has ready to fly from southern Lebanon, opening another front in the war and potentially overwhelming Israel's military capacity. The fact that just one of Iran's highly potent missiles could have claimed thousands of Israeli lives had it slipped through the IDF's defenses should give us great pause.

On the other hand, Iran's attack taught Israel and its friends some essential lessons:

1 - We are living in the Zionist era of Jewish history.

Jews are no longer powerless. Zionism was the Jewish people's conscious choice to reclaim power and agency so that Jews would no longer be helpless victims in an often cruel and violent world. The State of Israel has one of the strongest and most capable armies in the world, and, thanks to its partnership with the U.S., some of the most advanced weapons on earth. A week later, in a careful and measured way Israel used those military assets, its technological superiority and its exceptional brainpower to deliver back to Iran, directly, the message it will not tolerate or allow such any attack to go unanswered.

October 7 and the rising tide of antisemitism worldwide reminded us that Jews are still vulnerable, but that we can and will defend ourselves. This is the lesson of Israel's war against Hamas, which was powerfully reinforced by Israel's defensive prowess on April 13 and its subsequent response.

2 - We are not alone.

When Israel launched its just war of self-defense against Hamas in Gaza, the sympathy generated by the brutal attacks of October 7 quickly evaporated, leaving Israelis and Diaspora Jews feeling abandoned and alone in the world. It has been devastating and beyond painful to feel betrayed by those we thought were our friends and to endure rampant lies and distortions regarding Israel's actions and intentions.

But on April 13, we learned that we are not alone. The US, the UK, France, and even Jordan came to Israel's defense, sharing intelligence, and shooting down Iranian missiles. Even Saudi Arabia shared intelligence with Israel. This was a stunning development.

This reality must be carefully guarded and stewarded. As New York Times columnist Bret Stephens has argued, Israel's alliance with the West and its growing ties with Sunni Arab nations is more valuable to Israel than the deterrent effect of acts of reprisal, justified though they may be.

3 - The war in Gaza is but only one front in a global war against radical jihadist Islam.

April 13 reminded the world that Israel is at war with an enemy greater than Hamas and has, in fact, long been engaged in a shadow war that Iran has waged through its proxies in Gaza, Lebanon, Syria, Iraq, and Yemen. Last week, the U.S. chargé d'affaires in Israel, Stephanie Hallet, whom I was privileged to see and meet again during my recent trip to Israel, told the group of Rabbis I was with that Gaza is just one front in a global conflict between the West and radical Jihadist Islam led by Iran. Israel knew this before April 13. Now there is no denying it is true, making it crystal clear what is at stake in Gaza, on Israel's northern border, and in the entire region, as Iran moves ominously closer to producing nuclear weapons that it has sworn to use against Israel and the West.

4 - A new Middle East is emerging.

It's been argued that Hamas's attack on October 7 was intended to provoke a response that would scuttle the process of reconciliation between Israel and Saudi Arabia, which would signal the end of the Israeli-Arab conflict. The Saudi support for Israel on April 13 proved that this attempt has failed.

Though the death toll cynically manufactured and exaggerated by Hamas in Gaza has strained relations between Israel and its Sunni Arab neighbors, it hasn't derailed them. Not one of the existing peace treaties has been abrogated, not one of the Abraham Accord nations has withdrawn from the pact, and Saudi Arabia is still indicating that it intends to normalize relations with Israel. And, stunningly, Jordan and the Saudis came to Israel's defense on April 13.

The end of the historic conflict between Israel and the Arab nations is now within reach, replaced by an even more dangerous war between the Sunni Arab states and the Shiite axis led by Iran. In this reality, Israel would be part of a powerful alliance with significant economic and security benefits.

While Elijah didn't walk through our doors during the seder to announce with fanfare the advent of peace, there is reason to be hopeful. If the West, led by the U.S., pulls together with the Sunni-Israeli alliance to oppose and thwart Iran's nefarious schemes, a more peaceful and prosperous world could well emerge. For Israel, the opportunities are great, but work remains to be done and there are significant obstacles to overcome.

There's a strong consensus in Israel and the Jewish world that Hamas cannot be allowed to emerge from this war with its military and governance capacities intact. That would mean a bleak future for the Palestinian population, as no one in their right mind would agree to rebuild Gaza only to have it destroyed again when Hamas resumes its attacks on Israel, which it has sworn to do. There are still more than 100,000 Israelis who are internal refugees, having been displaced from their homes in the north and the south. The war cannot end until they can return home, rebuild their lives, and live in peace and security. And there are still hostages who need to be released and returned to their families, those who are living and those who have died.

As we bring to a close our Festival of Freedom, we actually have a lot for which to be grateful. Even with hearts breaking for the anguish of the hostages and their families, we can acknowledge that the IDF and its brave soldiers have made great sacrifices to secure the future of our precious Jewish State, and I believe they have fought this just war as justly and morally as possible. Now it's possible to dream of a future in which the threats against Israel will be diminished. To this hope and this possibility, we say l'shanah ha-ba'ah bi-Yerushalayim. Next year in Jerusalem. Next year in peace.



Cantor Kates holds a BA in Performing Arts and Creative Dramatics from Beloit College. She has been both a classroom teacher and education specialist in Atlanta Jewish Schools for over 20 years and a Shlichat Tzibbur for over a decade. She has toured as an Artist in Residence through the Institute for Southern Jewish Living, performed at Haddasah National Conventions, Federation fundraising events, Women's Conventions, CAJE and New-CAJE Jewish education conferences, JCC's and synagogues throughout the United States and in Canada. She most recently served in a cantor role at Congregation Ahavath Achim, in Atlanta, GA, for eight years, and has provided b'nai mitzvah training and tutoring both within congregations, as well as for unaffiliated families, around the Atlanta area since 1999.

As lead singer for The Baal Shem Tones, she has released three albums that include niggunim, traditional songs and original







Jewish music co-written with her husband and bandmate Michael Kates. Their first album All Our Lives released in 2004 to wide critical acclaim. Their latest album Eight Songs for Children intertwines Hebrew and English in a way that children will learn them seamlessly. The songs from all three of their albums are being sung in Jewish schools, senior centers and synagogues around the world.

Kates describes her journey to becoming a Hazzan as "a long, short road." Long because it began in childhood and took her through many twists and turns before receiving her clergy ordination, first through the Jewish Renewal Spiritual Education Program in 2017, and then receiving vestiture with the Cantor's Assembly in 2023. However, she feels that those paths were always leading to the same place in ever deepening layers, and always close at hand. She experiences the Torah as a gift of guidance through life's challenges. Ordained as a Maggidah Omanit, Kates works with individuals and their families to explore and strengthen their intrinsic bond to the Torah and Mitzvot through the transformational power of story and song.





Message From the President

My Final Thoughts

This is my last column as President. So, I thought you might find it interesting to see a bit of Herzl-Ner Tamid through my lens and hear about some of what I've learned the past two years.

I came into this role with a very limited understanding of the breadth and depth of the activity that goes on at HNT and in most synagogues, for that matter. I had some insights from being Treasurer for three years, but that was primarily from a dollars and cents perspective. What I've learned is just how many people it takes to make a mission-driven organization like HNT work. And not just how many people, but people that are caring and dedicated.

We are all aware of a few pieces of the puzzle, but they are different for each one of us. When you put them all together, it's simply amazing that all the pieces work.

Let me start with the Mitzvah Corps. The Mitzvah Corps is behind the scenes but steps up immediately when the need arises ... and that need is almost every week. Judy Ziedman and her team (and she loves adding new people to the team) bring the meals to the sick, drive the unable to doctor appointments, and provide many more vital community support activities we rarely hear about.

The Social Action Committee has a dedicated group currently led by Dafna Tarlowe and Cheryl Cohen that are constantly driving great programs – feeding the poor, helping the homeless, aiding immigrants, and helping to shelter abused women and children. Just check the HaKol or eKol every issue for opportunities to be part of a group that truly represents the spirit of Tikkun Olam.

The Membership Committee chaired by Gail Wiener and Ed Margolis. This committee ensures there is member engagement. They organize the New Members Brunch, Block Parties, Shabbat Dinner Circles and other community building activities. And they organize greeters at services to ensure we have a welcoming environment to members and quests alike.

I haven't mentioned many of the less visible groups. The Security Committee, headed by David Berkman, coincidentally was just formed prior to October 7th. As you can imagine, they have had their hands full thinking through the security needs of today and the future. And the newly formed Legal and Governance Committee, headed by Rachel Dobrow Stone and Adam Droker, is addressing existing contracts and redoing our outdated, 20th century

by-laws. And the legal subcommittee of Ryan Sternoff and Robert Amkraut spend 2-3 hours daily ensuring HNT is properly represented on the Barnabie Point Project. Not to mention Sonny Putter and Aaron Kiviat who are the HNT reps on the Barnabie Point Steering Committee investing countless hours to make sure all aspects of the project fit with HNT's best interests.

Nor have I mentioned the annual fundraiser – this year's incredible Gadol Gala. Next year's fundraiser planning is starting shortly – that's 10 to 11 months in advance. And that's how Kara Schultz, Ilene Sloan, Kathy Packer, and Sarah Hasson, the co-chairs of the event, were able to make this year's Gala such a success ... starting early, investing lots of time, and being totally committed.

Or the Reengagement Task Force, Organized by Susan Edelheit, Ilene Sloan, and Rabbi Herber. With Jenn Rosenwald leading the 3rd Space working group, Lindsay O'Neil leading the Marketing working group. Aurora Bearse, heading the Membership working group. Much of the work being done has been behind the scenes. You'll see the fruits of their labor over the coming months and years.

But we are a religious organization, and that's the foundation of our values and everything we do. So, we rely on the Ritual Committee led by Jaime Slutzky and Rabbi Herber to make many of the decisions that ensure the religious side is running smoothly. That includes things we rarely think about like keeping the Torahs in top condition. In fact, the sofer stam is coming this month to make repairs and assess the value of the Torahs. Again, we don't think much about it, but their replacement value is close to a half million dollars, and we need to protect that synagogue asset.

We are incredibly lucky. We survived this year without a cantor. That's in part due to the Rabbi filling the void, but a great deal of the credit goes to those congregants who have stepped up to lead services and read Torah. We have come to count on people like Kennis Koldewyn, Alan Wilensky, Efrem Krisher, Elana Hornstein, Joel Konikow, Amy Wasser, Colton Robbins, Marvin Stern, Craig Weinstein and a myriad of others to ensure we have meaningful services every week. And the regular Morning Minyan group, a cornerstone of our Congregation, is absolutely vital for those needing a minyan for yahrzeits.

The busiest time of year is the High Holidays. Most of us arrive and expect the Rabbi and Cantor to have the service nailed and the logistics all taken care of. And that's what happens. But it happens because planning starts in early May

to make sure every aspect is thought through and the proper prep is done. When we hired Rabbi Bendel as the Cantor last year, he didn't just show up and do his part. Rabbi Herber spent hours of time with him in advance to ensure a smooth-running service. And people like Brenda Luper, Jaime Slutzky, Aaron Okrent, and other volunteers were running around finding those with honors and communicating to the clergy so the rest of us could enjoy services.

And what about our youth? The B'nai Mitzvah Prep. The biggest day in many of our youngsters' lives couldn't be done without the skills of Sherri Shulman, our excellent tutors, and the Rabbi providing guidance for the d'var and more.

And our Frankel Religious School is as effective as ever. This is a tribute to Irit Eliav Levin's leadership, her administrative sidekick Jessica Slayter, and the amazing group of teachers we've assembled to educate our kids. If you're not affiliated with the Religious School, as two-thirds of our membership is not, you should look at the weekly communication from Irit which demonstrates just how many programs and activities are going on and available for our youth and their families to participate in. Putting the weekly communique together is very time consuming, but the comprehensiveness and attention to detail is critical in keeping the parents and students engaged and informed.

And it takes a special professional staff and clergy to keep all the pieces together.

Talk to the staff. You know they care deeply about HNT and about doing a great job. Merav is no longer here, but you wouldn't find anyone who worked harder, put in more hours (she was available 24/7), and cared more about serving HNT. Arianne Slayter is simply a star as Director of Finance & Personnel. Josh Niehaus brings incredible creativity, musical ability, and a connection with people – both young and old. Melanie Miller has her hands in so many things that keep HNT running – security, vendor contracts, custodial, and more. The same goes for Aviva, Jessica, Rei, Glin, and Adi ... all dedicated to serving our membership.

And Clergy. I was never someone who had a relationship with a Rabbi. I always viewed the Rabbi from a distance; this role fortunately changed that for me. I have found Rabbi Herber and Rabbi Rosenbaum, though having very different styles, both dedicated and caring individuals wanting to do the right thing for HNT and its congregants. I never realized just how all-consuming the role of a Rabbi is – from being available for funerals, shivas, counseling individuals, and visiting the sick to running services, teaching classes, participating in community activities, and attending a myriad of meetings. And when do they find the time to prep for their sermons or, G-d forbid, have any sort of personal life?

I promise ... I'm closing down ... but I did learn a lot and there are so many people doing so many good things!

Take a look at the Board. We've probably not done a great job of communicating to everyone just how many issues and initiatives we've dealt with to try to make HNT a better place. But it is a committed group that continues to show passion and commitment despite a never-ending list of items to address. I think I've set a record for most emergency meetings called and longest Board Meetings. (That's mostly my fault; I need to take a class in keeping meetings on point and on time.)

I've had the privilege of working with an Executive Committee that couldn't be more dedicated. Ilene Sloan, Lindsay O'Neil, Ilyse Wagner, Elana Hornstein, and Jeff Packer. The number of hours they have put in on meetings, committee involvement, writing communications, dealing with personnel issues, and keeping us financially stable is ridiculous. Apologies to their families who don't see them often and may not recognize them with the newly acquired gray hairs.

Learning Torah Skills



A Message from Director of Education Irit Eliav Levin

"From the second night of *Pesah* until the night before *Shavuot*, we count the *omer*.

I am about to fulfill the *mitzvah* of counting the *omer*, as it is written in the Torah: 'You shall count from the eve of the second day of *Pesah*, when an *omer* of grain is to be brought as an offering, seven complete weeks. The day after the seventh week of your counting will make fifty days.' - Leviticus 23:15-16

Baruch atah Adonai, our God, sovereign of time and space, who has provided us with a path to holiness through the observance of mitzvot and instructed us to count the omer. Baruch atah Adonai eloheinu melech ha-olam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu al s'firat ha-omer." (Siddur Lev Shalem)

This prayer, which we recite for 49 days, helps us to mark the time between the observance of Passover, celebrating our freedom from slavery, to the time of Shavuot, when we celebrate the receiving of the Torah. Much has been written about the fact that we count up during this period. Our natural tendency is to count down, kids count down the minutes until recess, we count down the days until a special occasion... yet, here we count up. The Rabbis teach us that it is because we should always be working to increase our mitzvot, therefore we count up to the day when we received those mitzvot, received the Torah at Sinai.

This year, counting up will feel different. This year, each day I will hold in my mind the image of Rachel Goldberg and Jon Polin, who put on a piece of masking tape every day with the number of days that their son, Hersh Goldberg-Polin, has been held captive in Gaza, along with 132 other men, women, and children. The strength and resilience this family has shown in a time of unimaginable horror is extraordinary to me. I

can't imagine the intensity of emotions they must have experienced when, as Jews around the world were celebrating Pesach, Hamas released a video of Hersh and they were able to hear their son's voice and see his face for the first time in over 200 days. I pray every day that their count will be over because their son, and all of the remaining hostages, are returned safely.

Traditionally, the time of the *omer* is considered to be a period of mourning, honoring the memory of the 24,000 students of Rabbi Akiva who perished during this time. Certainly, feeling a sense of mourning will not be difficult this year - mourning for lives lost, for all those who are hungry and frightened, and even mourning the loss of the people we were and the dreams we held on October 6th, in the time before.

The Talmud teaches us that the students of Rabbi Akiva died because they treated each other disrespectfully. The Rabbis also teach that we are supposed to use the Omer as a period of self-growth, just as the Israelites had to evolve from a mentality of slavery to being emotionally and mentally prepared to receive the Torah at Sinai.

This year, I pray that as a Jewish community, we take seriously the lessons of the Omer, and keep working together to address antisemitism and to work to build bridges both across our own community and with those around us. Most of all, I pray that the Goldberg-Polin family will be able to stop counting the days because Hersh, and all of the other 132 hostages, will be home in plenty of time to have cheesecake and blintzes with their families for Shavuot. May it be so and soon.


