A Message from Rabbi Jacob Herber

During the Hebrew month of Elul we're asked to prepare ourselves spiritually for the promise of another, new year. We do a deep dive of introspection and reflection which, we hope, will lead us to *teshuvah*, repentance. This endeavor of selfimprovement is meant to be grounded in our Jewish values.

The Kotzker Rebbe teaches that the verse "You shall be holy beings to me" (Exodus 22:31) should be understood to mean that because God has enough angels, what God really needs are holy human beings. While angels are static creatures, we humans are multi-dimensional. We are fallible, but also capable of self-improvement. And this is precisely why God wants us in this world.

During this season of repentance, we should understand that neither we nor God is judging us against the yardstick of perfection. We aren't angels and God neither expects nor wants us to be them. Instead, God celebrates the fact that we are mere mortals, with all our shortcomings, but with the God given ability to become better versions of ourselves. And *teshuvah* is the pathway for accomplishing this goal.

As we prepare for these Days of Awe, we need to remember to avoid being overwhelmed by the unrealistic expectations we may impose on ourselves because of the misperception that our tradition demands we be perfect, angelic, in the way we live. This isn't just false; it can be incredibly discouraging. How could we possibly meet such a standard? At the same time, we should be cognizant of the fact that God values who we are as human beings. So while being perfect isn't what's expected, our improvement as moral and ethical people and our scared living surely is.

It's important to ask ourselves some fundamental questions, especially now: "How can I live differently so that I can be a better person?" "What commitment can I make which will enable me to feel more connected to God, Judaism, my family, my people?" "What will it take to fill my life with real, important, existential meaning?"

As the Friday night song, "*Shalom Aleikhem*" reminds us, Angels are honored visitors and messengers of God. But they aren't a part of this world. We, on the other hand, do inhabit this realm, and it's up to us to live in it in the best, most morally aspirational way as possible. May we all succeed in this important undertaking.

Why the Black-Jewish Relationship is More Relevant than Ever Rabbi Jay Rosenbaum

O n June 24-25, I co-organized a Conference on Black-Jewish Relations at the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York, my alma mater. Attending the conference were 8 Black ministers and 7 rabbis representing Seattle, New York, Philadelphia, New Haven, Chicago, San Francisco, New Orleans and Atlanta. The retreat grew out of our National Black-Jewish Clergy Bible study group which is now entering its fifth year. This group is an outgrowth of a local Seattle equivalent which is entering its sixth year. And we are very excited about our latest project: writing a Black-Jewish commentary on the first chapters of Exodus. We hope it will be ready for circulation by next Passover.

Many people have asked me why I continue to engage in this bridge building work. With the growth of antisemitism and anti-Zionism, shouldn't we be focusing on the challenges of the Jewish people exclusively? And, besides, I've heard people say, "we have been there for the Black community, but where was the Black community on October 7th?"

Of course, we should be wary of making broad generalizations about any community. Our local Black-Jewish Clergy group published a powerful letter of support for Israel and condemnation of Hamas in the Seattle Times on December 19. Nevertheless, the attitude of many Black leaders around the country has been troubling. The New York Times reported that in January, more than 1000 Black pastors called for a cease fire, and many expressed disappointment in President's unwavering support for Israel in its war against Hamas. Speaking of the Palestinians, Rev. Cynthia Hale of Georgia said, "We see them as part of us. They are oppressed people. We are oppressed people."

For those of us who remember Dr. Martin Luther King, jr. marching arm and arm in Selma with Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, not to mention the murders of Schwerner, Goodman and Chaney, it may come as a shock to see ourselves perceived as oppressors by so many prominent Black leaders. But the Black-Jewish relationship did not deteriorate overnight. Dr. King was a staunch supporter of the State of Israel. But, as early as the mid-sixties young leaders like Stokely Carmichael (later Kwame Ture) were already portraying Israel as a white supremacist oppressive colonialist state. I remember passing by the Apollo Theater in Harlem in 1975 and seeing only three letters lit up: P-L-0.

Relationships cannot live on distant memories. I came of age in the midst of the Civil Rights Movement. I heard my father give sermons on racial equality and defend a Black fire chief's right to buy a home in our suburban New York town (against the will of some of his congregants). But the Black-Jewish relationship has been deteriorating for over fifty years.

It is naïve for us to say we were abandoned by our friends in 2024, when the Black-Jewish relationship has been frayed for several decades.

The reasons for Black-Jewish tensions are complicated and beyond the scope of a short article. But, in my conversations with Jewish and Black friends and colleagues over the past five years I will say this: Each community feels abandoned by the other. Many Blacks believe that Jews 'became white'-- succeeded economically, moved into white neighborhoods, and left their Black friends and neighbors behind. One Black woman said to me "We get it. You made it to the popular table (in the high school lunchroom). Who wouldn't want to be at that table?"

Many Jews, on the other hand, believe that Jews got booted out of the Civil Rights Movement when Black pride required Black leaders to be less dependent on white people. Worse, we got ejected from the 'oppressed club,' and we were deemed to be on the side of the enemy.

Under the circumstances, there is a strong temptation for Blacks and Jews to just walk away from each other. But I don't think that's possible. It seems that this relationship is rarely at neutral. It's either very good or very bad. And, right now, the weakness of our relationship with the Black community is hurting us. The Israeli-Palestinian conflict has been racialized. Increasingly Israel is being considered racist by its very existence. Those of us who remember better days may be stunned by this, but we should not give up hope that we can turn things around. It is not too late for us to repair this relationship, but it will take time and a lot of understanding. At our conference in New York, Dr. Stephen Ray told us that he believes that the Black-Jewish relationship is one of the best things that ever happened to America. For all of the complexities of the past several decades, the Jewish community is still the only non-Black ethnic group that consistently votes for Black candidates. It is not mere coincidence that Governor Josh Shapiro was one of the first Democratic politicians to endorse Barak Obama in his bid for the presidency. President Obama has never forgotten it and they have been close ever since.

In our New York conference, Dr. Ray said that the Civil Rights Movement did not prepare for its own success. That is, the Movement ended Southern segregation, but there was no clear vision of what was next. Defining racism and a path to racial progress are far more complicated today than they were in 1963. What new moral vision of America could Blacks and Jews share? That is a conversation I'd like to have! With a Black woman presidential candidate married to a Jewish man, perhaps this is a window of opportunity for Blacks and Jews to begin a new kind of conversation, and rejuvenate a relationship which could benefit both our communities and most of all, America.

It is a powerful experience involving the closeness of many generations, the joining of spirit to spirit and the connection of soul to soul. Those who transmit the Torah and those who receive it meet one another at the same historic juncture."
