A Message from Rabbi Jaymee Alpert

In just a few short weeks, we will begin the Hebrew month of Elul. Elul precedes Tishrei, the month in which we celebrate Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur, as well as Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret, and Simchat Torah.

Elul is a prep month – not only for the synagogue office, as we tend to the details of the High Holidays, but also for us as a community. Traditionally, during Elul, we blow shofar during morning services except on Shabbat, and we recite Psalm 27 during the daily morning and evening liturgy. These added rituals help us to wake up spiritually and to ready ourselves for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

We prepare for the High Holidays as individuals as well. Elul invites us to begin the process of Heshbon HaNefesh, of taking stock of who we are and who we wish to become. We search our hearts and souls and ask ourselves big life questions, like: am I living up to the best in myself? Are my priorities aligned with my values? What needs to change or shift in the year ahead so that I may act with greater integrity?

Heshbon HaNefesh can be daunting, because when we are honest with ourselves, we must confront the times we fell short. However, Heshbon HaNefesh can be energizing as well, as we learn or affirm what is most

important to us. The process is especially powerful when we approach it from a place of love, rather than guilt or fear. The rabbis teach that Elul is an acronym for "Ani l'dodi v'dodi li," the phrase from the Song of Songs that means "I am my beloved and my beloved is mine." Our tradition believes that God is especially close during the month of Elul and throughout the High Holiday season, and so we are encouraged to call on God sincerely. I would add that we become beloved to ourselves when we offer ourselves compassion and kindness as we do the soul-work of Elul.

I will be joining you in Seattle about mid-way through the month of Elul, and I look forward to getting to know you as we prepare for the High Holidays and the fall holiday season.

May this Elul give us the opportunity to examine where we have been and where we would like to be going, so that we begin the new year 5786 with authenticity, with hope, and with joy.




Memorial Book

Multiple Paths to Becoming a Better Person

Our Tradition teaches us that thirty days before Rosh Hashanah we should begin a 'cheshbon hanefesh,' an honest inventory of the good things and not so good things we've done during the past year. The goal is to make ourselves better human beings.

The process of making things right is called "teshuvah" from the Hebrew root meaning 'to return.' Typically, this is understood to mean that we are to return to the moment of moral failure and by honestly confronting our mistake, we can begin again.

Most of us are familiar with the rabbinic teaching that this is the time of the year to acknowledge ways in which we've hurt other people, and to approach our families, friends and neighbors seeking forgiveness. This is certainly a very important thing to do, and it takes a lot of honesty and courage. But it is not the only way to do teshuvah.

Maimonides teaches that not only should we repent for specific wrongs that we committed. We need to address the root of our actions and create systemic change within ourselves. In the late 19th century an entire movement arose devoted to developing techniques for improving our character. It was called the Mussar Movement. Mussar teachers explored the range of character traits that make up every human personality, including patience, courage, diligence, gratitude, order, simplicity and more.

Every human being possesses all of these traits, but while one person is motivated heavily by a need to keep things in order, another person might be stronger on the enthusiasm side. The goal of teshuvah for Mussar teachers is to reinforce what we're already good at, and to strengthen the parts of ourselves which need improvement. For a great introductory guide to how to do this, I recommend Alan Morinis's "Everyday Holiness."

Finally, there is a way of doing teshuvah that might surprise us. Rabbi Zelig Pliskin teaches that every one of us experiences positive states of mind many times a day. He encourages us to name them, collect them, write them down and go back to them frequently. For Rabbi Pliskin, teshuvah is not a return to the moment we've done wrong. It's a return to when things were right.

Each of us has experienced moments of deep satisfaction, inner serenity, joyful enthusiasm, and moments when someone has touched us deeply. The month of Elul for Pliskin is a time to return to those moments and to draw strength and inspiration from them.

When we revisit these moments, we should ask ourselves: "What was it about this moment that made me feel so good? How can I take something of this experience and expand it, and apply to brand new situations?"

All of the above approaches to teshuvah are available to us. This year, as a way of making teshuvah especially accessible, Herzl-Ner Tamid is offering a 24 day guide to reflection and action. Beginning two weeks before Rosh Hashanah, for each day, you will receive:

- Ideas for working on yourself (tikkun atzmi)
- Suggestions for acts of tzedakah/Kindness (tikkun olam)
- Opportunities to connecting Jewishly

Barnabie Point Project Update

Closing In on Groundbreaking in Fall 2025

The development of Barnabie Point, a shared Jewish campus on Mercer Island, has taken major steps forward over the summer. This initiative has always been about more than just a building. It's about creating the infrastructure our community needs to grow and thrive for schools, for families, and for Jewish life across Puget Sound.

City Approvals

In mid-July, after a lengthy hearing, the City of Mercer Island Hearing Examiner ruled in favor of the BPP project and formally approved most of our Land Use Application, including the environmental study (SEPA) and the Conditional Use Permit. Only Design Review remains to be finalized. In addition, our building permit was submitted and is actively under review.

Building Design

Design Review is the final step of the Land Use Application process. With building permits submitted, the next step is design review by the city. Exterior renderings are complete as initial concepts for interior spaces are beginning to take shape. Every element—from shared gathering areas to classrooms and offices—is being designed with long-term use in mind: flexible layouts, beautiful and durable materials, and multi-purpose functionality that will serve the community for decades to come.

Coworking Space

We are delighted to share that both Friendship Circle and Camp Solomon Schechter have already signed letters of intent to lease space in the third-floor community hub. With ~50% of the available space spoken for, the vision of a "Jewish WeWork" is becoming real. That demand reflects a clear need for secure, affordable, mission-aligned space—where Jewish organizations can work, gather, and build community. Being together in person isn't just practical; it is core to how Jewish life is sustained and passed on.

The Audacity To Build Something New

With groundbreaking well on track for this fall, Barnabie Point is poised to bring together essential parts of Jewish life on the Eastside: a permanent home for JDS, a modernized facility for Herzl-Ner Tamid's education programs, and shared space for the broader community. The third-floor hub offers secure, affordable, mission-aligned offices for Jewish nonprofits—and creates a lasting campus for the next generation of families and leaders.



A Message from Director of Education Irit Eliav Levin



In August, we will observe the holiday of Tisha B'Av, literally the ninth of Av, a day in which we commemorate the destruction of both the First and Second Temples in Jerusalem. Many other tragedies that have befallen the Jewish people have also been connected to this day, making it a day of fasting and mourning. Interestingly, we are not permitted to simply study Torah on this day, as Torah study brings us great joy. Rather we must focus on passages that are mournful, in keeping with the tone of the day.

The classic text that is studied on Tisha B'Av, is the story of Kamza and Bar Kamza, found below:

The destruction of Jerusalem came through a Kamza and a Bar Kamza. A certain man had a friend Kamza and an enemy Bar Kamza. He once made a party and said to his servant, "Go and bring Kamza." The servant went and brought Bar Kamza. When the man [the host] found him there he said, "See, you tell tales about me; what are you doing here? Get out." Said the other (Bar Kamza): "Since I am here, let me stay, and I will pay you for whatever I eat and drink." He (the host) said No. "Then let me give you half the cost of the party." "No", said the host. "Then let me pay for the whole party." He still said, "No", and he took him by the hand and threw him out. Said the other (Bar Kamza), "Since the Rabbis were sitting there and did not stop him, this shows that they agreed with him. I will go and inform against them to the (Roman) Government.

- Babylonian Talmud Gittin 55b

This Talmudic story is often cited by the Rabbis as proof that it was baseless hatred that led to the destruction of the Second Temple. It is also seen as a reminder that details matter, as the small mistake in the name of the guest led to such a disastrous event. And of course, we are reminded of the importance of speaking up when we see a wrong being committed, for it was the silence of the Rabbis that led to Bar Kamza reporting the incident to the Roman Government.

This year, on Tisha B'Av, I'd like us to focus on what

came next. The destruction of the Temple was catastrophic, a loss we still feel and commemorate in many ways. But out of the ashes of the Temple, came a new Judaism. The Rabbis had to reinvent what it meant to be Jewish. We were no longer a people whose religion focused on sacrifices and offerings to God. Instead, we became a people who came together to pray and to study Torah. Instead of only being able to sacrifice at one holy site, we could create communities of prayer and learning around the world. We built synagogues and schools, developed holidays and traditions, and wrote prayers and songs that would unite us. We rebuilt our homeland, planting trees, training an army, and developing universities and hospitals revered around the world.

Unfortunately, the Jewish people have had many catastrophic events since the Temple was destroyed. The horrors of the Inquisition, the Holocaust, and pogroms continue to haunt us. The pain of October 7th, the capturing of the hostages, and the ugly antisemitic incidents that have followed, are constantly on our minds. But we are a people who know how to build beauty out of destruction. We know how to mourn for those lost, while continuing to build a better future for those who were left behind. And on this Tisha B'Av, that is exactly what we must do.

Let's take time on this sacred day to mourn all the tragedies that have befallen us. We can pause and remember those we have lost. We can shed tears for everything hatred has taken from us. But on the tenth of Av, we must dust ourselves off and begin building our new world. We must recreate what it means to be Jewish in our new reality, and that will require all of us stepping up and playing our part. I can't wait to see the new world that we create.
