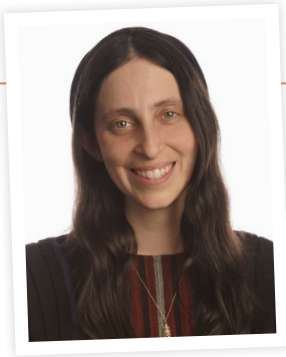

A Message from Rabbi Bria Cahana



With December and the winter rains upon us, many naturally feel the pull to retreat indoors and hibernate. But our tradition invites a different response: as the days grow darker, especially with the arrival of Hanukkah, we are called to gather together and bring more light into the world.

A midrash about Adam beautifully captures this invitation. Created in the month of Tishrei, Adam watched the days grow shorter over three months and feared the world was darkening because of his own failings. He fasted and prayed for eight days. At the winter solstice, he saw the days beginning to lengthen again. Realizing this was simply the world's natural rhythm, he then rejoiced for eight days.

This story offers many deep lessons. When the world feels dim, our inner world narrows, and we may imagine that the darkness is permanent or somehow our fault. This can lead to intense self-blame and catastrophic thinking. But often, when we tumble down that rabbit hole, we are missing a larger truth: something greater is at work and a miracle is quietly taking shape. Like Adam, we can turn despair into reflection and prayer. And sometimes the miracle simply is that when we sit through the dark with open eyes and open heart, we eventually see the light returning or, even more powerful, we change, and we see things in a different light.

This year we will already be celebrating Hanukkah and kindling the lights before the winter solstice, when the days begin to brighten again. This is because the light of Hanukkah is different from the light of the celestial spheres. Hanukkah's light is a spiritual light, understood on a Jewish mystical level as the primordial light of creation that emerged on the first day of Creation.

The *chanukiya* is placed at our windows for this reason: the spiritual light we kindle is meant both to illuminate our inner world and to shine outward. Hanukkah calls us not only to nurture our internal light of hope and resilience, but also to bring that light into the places in our community where it is most needed. In doing so, we become partners in revealing miracles for ourselves and others.

May we bring more light into our homes, our hearts, and our world. And may this season's darkness become an invitation to notice the miracles that are all around us and waiting to be revealed.

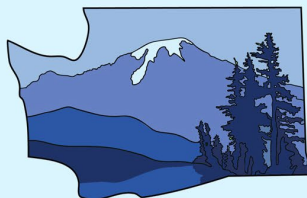
Up, Up & Away Program!

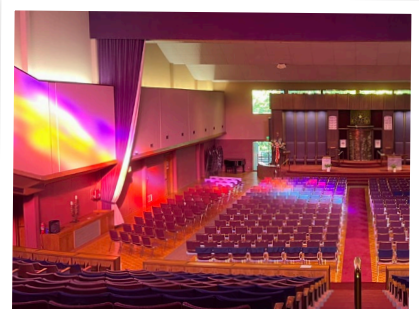

A Message from Director of Education Irit Eliav Levin



FRANKEL
RELIGIOUS SCHOOL
WHERE JEWISH LEARNING FLOURISHES

In the Talmud (Kiddushin 29a), we receive a list of obligations that parents have for their children. Parents must provide a bris for a son, and today many parents also choose to have a Simchat Bat for a daughter. Parents must teach their children Torah, guide them to reaching the chuppah, and teach them a trade. And then, a seemingly random additional line: parents are also obligated to teach their children to swim. Why swimming? Because it emphasizes that we must teach our children to survive independently, to be safe when danger might present itself. Most of all, it is a way to prepare our children for whatever the future might have in store, giving them the tools to stay afloat when life presents challenges.

So, having taken this lesson to heart, I've been diligently taking my kids to weekly swim lessons for the last couple of years. While my eldest son picked things up quickly and is now a proficient swimmer, my younger two kids have taken a little longer. For a long time, it felt like we were making little progress. Though they diligently kicked, floated, and tried out different swimming strokes, they weren't feeling confident enough to swim independently. I started to wonder if all the time and money we were putting into lessons was worth it! Then, all of a sudden, in the last few weeks, they started swimming! They are moving around, floating independently, and the inhibitions they once had about being in the water are gone. And it has given them more confidence in other areas of their life as well. The lessons are working!

The situation can feel the same when teaching children anything. As always, the FRS staff has been working tirelessly to teach our students how to read and write Hebrew, how to follow along in the siddur, and how to

sing the different tunes and melodies of our services. As they initially stumble through, it can feel like progress is slow. One step at a time. Then, all of a sudden, you can see everything come together! And it is magical!

That is exactly what happened last month at our first TGIS (Thank God It's Shabbat) service of the year, which was also part of our fabulous Artists in Residence Weekend. For months, we've been working with our Kitah Bet - Hey students on learning the prayers so that they could be on the bimah. They've spent hours sounding out the Hebrew, practicing the prayers, and singing the melodies. Though we believed in them, we knew they were a little nervous. And then, they were AMAZING! They were poised, confident, and singing proudly. They knew the words, they knew the tunes, they knew how to lead. All of their hard work had paid off!

All of the time, money, and energy that parents invest in their children's Jewish education can feel like the swim lessons. Especially in the beginning, it can be hard to see the progress they are making. But when everything clicks and you can see all of their hard work paying off, it is extraordinary. In addition to Hebrew and prayers, we are teaching them about Jewish history, about Israel, Jewish music, and so much more. We are helping to shape their Jewish identities and teaching them the importance of being part of a Jewish community. We are shaping the next generation of Jewish leaders. And I can't wait to see the exceptional people they become!

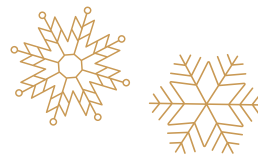

Evelyn Sophia Rosen • December 13



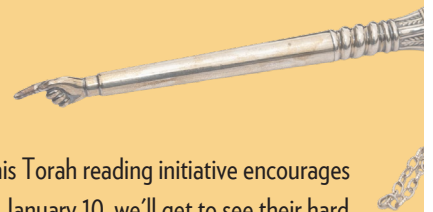

Part immersive theatre and part civic forum, with audiences placed at the center of a live, high-stakes conversation, *The Israeli Palestinian Conversation* had its sold-out world premiere last May in Boulder, Colorado. 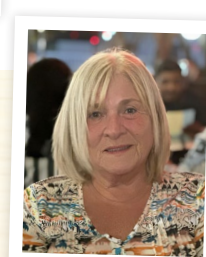
Introduction to Mussar

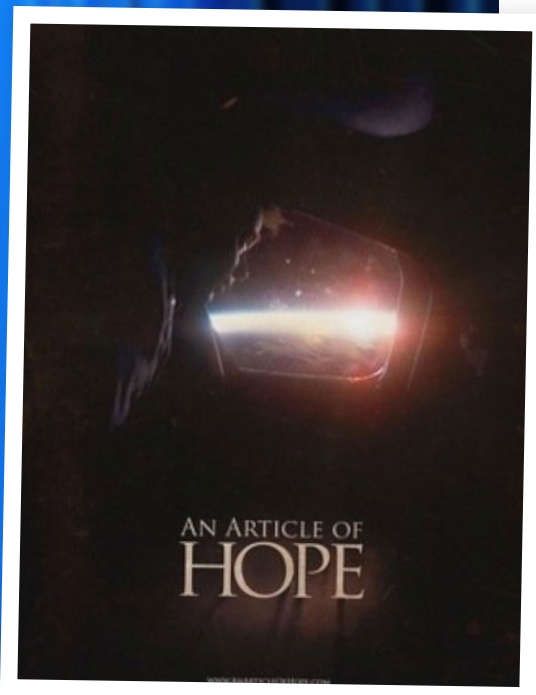
Free during the day? Join us for good conversation, tasty lunch, and a Jewish-themed film with a special Zoom Q&A with the director!

MITZVAH CORPS

MAKING A DIFFERENCE IN YOUR COMMUNITY

The word mitzvah literally means commandment. These commandments are traditionally understood to come from God and are intended for the Jewish people to observe.

Accordingly, the HNT Mitzvah Corps is committed to providing mitzvot to our fellow congregants in ways that demonstrate our caring and compassion. Whether offering a Shiva or Shabbat meal, making an in-person visit to someone who would welcome a friendly face, or providing a ride to an appointment or Shabbat services, we are, in our own way, following God's commandments to do good.

A favorite annual project is our High Holiday Goody Bag outreach, in which congregants who have recently gone through difficult times receive a festive bag containing challah, apples, and honey, along with wishes for a sweet year. This is our way of reaching out and providing a bit of TLC—and who doesn't need that at times?

Mitzvah Corps is not a regular committee as the word committee might suggest. We don't have meetings that require attendance. Instead, we have a database of volunteers to whom I reach out when help is needed. Outcomes from the World Zionist Congress 2025

After a long two weeks of intensive political work at and following the Zionist Congress, a final agreement has been signed that will divide up positions and responsibilities as well as anchor funding and policy commitments from the national institutions over the next five years: WZO, KKL/JNF, the Jewish Agency, and Keren HaYesod. MERCAZ's representatives and their teams played not just a leading role, but perhaps the central role in securing a broad agreement that unifies the Jewish people and enables these institutions to advance their important work at this pivotal moment for Israel and the Jewish people.

In the framework of this agreement, we have delivered on our core promises to you - MERCAZ supporters around the world - which we laid out during our election campaigns in over a dozen countries worldwide.

- A 50% increase in funding allocation to streams including Conservative and Reform institutions and their programs that will benefit our communities. Both in Israel and worldwide.
- Increased funding for MERCAZ's Zionist and Israel education programming.
- Expanded Conservative/Masorti representation on various boards and decision-making bodies that will make funding allocation and policy decisions over the next five years - a result of our 15% increase in representation in the Congress.
- Relative to the previous term, MERCAZ and our pluralistic and liberal partners now hold more of the seniormost positions at the national institutions. In the last term, both top positions (KKL Chair and WZO Chair) were held by the right-wing/ultra-Orthodox bloc. In this term, the pluralistic/liberal bloc will hold half. Yair Netanyahu will NOT hold any position that requires political approval of any kind at the national institutions.

- Extremist allies of Itamar Ben Gvir are not included in the agreement and have been marginalized at the national institutions.
- Expanded authority for the WZO Vice Chair (MERCAZ's senior position in the institutions) and his office, enabling our team to further advance our work and values in the institutions.
- Passed resolutions by wide margins putting the Jewish people on record in favor of an equal draft law in Israel, the formation of an apolitical and impartial State Commission of Inquiry into October 7th, and equal treatment and infrastructure at the Egalitarian Kotel.

The very first thing we must say after listing these significant accomplishments is this: Thank you. These achievements simply would not have been possible without your hard work and support for MERCAZ during the recent election campaign. But what we've gotten done over this past month is just the beginning. We look forward to continuing our work over the coming five-year term, and together, continuing to deliver for Masorti/Conservative values and interests.

We are excited to introduce a new initiative designed to bring us closer together and strengthen the warm and welcoming community, and ensure fewer of those 'I know their face, but their name?' moments. **Beginning January 1**, we are encouraging everyone to wear a magnetic name tag, provided by us, when attending services and events.

Let's be honest, we have ALL had that moment where we spot someone across the room and think, 'Oh no, what IS their name again?' Or we want to introduce ourselves to a new guest but can't quite bridge the awkwardness. Good news: magnetic name tags to the rescue!

This simple step will make a significant difference:

Building Connections: Knowing each other's names helps transform "hello, friend" into "hello, [Name]," making our interactions more personal and meaningful.

Welcoming Guests: Name tags help visitors and new members easily identify long-standing members and staff, making them feel more at ease and connected from the moment they walk in the door.

Fostering an Inclusive Culture: When everyone wears a name tag, it symbolizes that we are all part of the same community. No hierarchy, no strangers, just us!

How It Works:

Pick Up Your Tag: Reusable, pre-printed magnetic name tags will be available for the initial launch of this project in alphabetical order (by last name) in alphabetized cases, on both sides at the back of the sanctuary. **In addition, those with pacemakers or medical devices will receive a lanyard.** Let us know.

For Guests: Visitors will have access to guest lanyards that say 'GUEST' to use during their visit.

Please Return: At the end of your visit, please return your name tag to the holders in the back of the sanctuary, under the letter where they belong.

We encourage everyone to wear their name tag while inside the building property, it's a small gesture that makes a big difference! If you are attending services on consecutive days, feel free to keep it with you. Deposit it to the nametag holders the following day.

We hope you will join us in embracing this initiative. Together, we can ensure that our synagogue remains a place where everyone is not just a face in the crowd, but a valued member known by name.

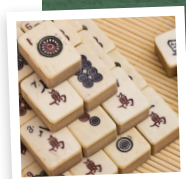

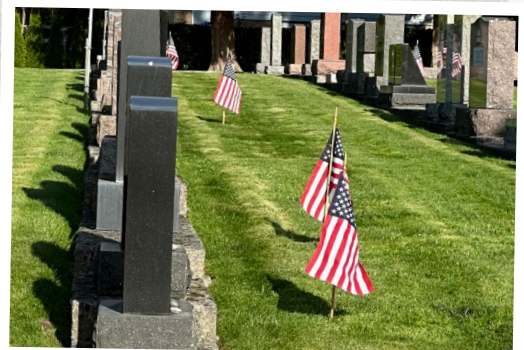
