A Message from Rabbi Briah Cahana

Nurturing Growth and Cultivating Faith

I remember fondly walking the streets of Jerusalem and noticing, over the course of a few months, how the trees transformed from blossom to fruit. Pomegranates, olives, and figs lined the sidewalks, framing the streets in Edenic scenes. There is something exciting, even miraculous, about witnessing fruit just as it begins to grow. Nothing can be harvested yet, and still there is a sense of abundance on its way.

Humans take real satisfaction in watching things grow, whether a tree, a child, or even a batch of muffins rising in the oven! And yet, most of the time, we lack the patience or proximity to observe transformation as it unfolds. Growth usually happens outside our line of sight, unless we pause to notice it or ritualize the passage of time.

Although Jewish history ultimately pushed our ancestors away from agricultural life, our tradition remains deeply rooted in the rhythms of the natural world and in this kind of ritualizing. Our holidays and prayers reflect lived knowledge of planting and harvest, rain and drought. As farmers have always known, rain can be a blessing or bring disaster depending on its timing and amount. That awareness is embedded in our liturgy, which shifts with the seasons and responds to what the land requires.

Tu Bishvat, the New Year of the Trees, brings us back to this way of thinking. Observed this year in early February, it marks a moment of transition that is largely invisible. In many parts of the world, renewal seems more naturally associated with spring, in April or May. In the Mishnah, however, this day serves as a demarcation for tithing, distinguishing last year's fruit from what is only beginning to emerge beneath the surface. Tu Bishvat anticipates growth that has not yet taken shape. By marking it before the trees are in full blossom, we acknowledge that new growth still depends, in part, on our care, patience, and trust. The rest lies beyond us,



in Divine blessing. This is the work of faith we get to practice this month: doing what we can to nurture what has been planted, without full evidence, while knowing that creation never belongs to us alone.

You can feel this even in the simplest acts: planting a seed on a kitchen windowsill, tending it, and seeing if and how it changes over weeks. Notice how quickly you become invested in its survival through the process of offering your care.

We know that not everything we plant comes to fruition. Still, the work of nurturing, of tending what has been entrusted to us, of caring for this world to the best of our abilities, is a holy endeavor. Through this work, we shape ourselves and our communities into nurturing, caring vessels.

May we carry this "Tu Bishvat mentality" through the month, paying attention to the forms of growth we are cultivating, both revealed and still unseen, yet replete with blessing. And through this process, may our faith in ourselves and in G-d grow ever stronger.

A Message from Director of Education Irit Eliav Levin

“Love the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt”

– Devarim 10:19

As many of you know, I wasn't born in America. I was born in Tel Aviv, to parents who had made aliyah from Argentina and Uruguay when they were teens. I came to the United States when I was just three months old. My parents, like many Israelis, decided to move to the U.S. for “two years.” That was more than forty years ago. We lived briefly in NY and then made our way to South Florida, where I grew up.

I didn't learn to speak English until I went to preschool at my childhood synagogue. At six years old, I went through the naturalization process. The social worker gave me a “test” to see if I was ready to become a citizen. I failed it. She asked me what the national bird was and I had just learned in Hebrew School that the dove was the sign of peace. So, I assumed that must be what America chose as its representative. I was wrong. Fortunately, I became a citizen anyway.

Like many immigrants, our extended families lived around the world. So, we found other families in the same boat. My parents became incredibly close with four other families. This group of five families has been affectionately nicknamed “the Mafia.” This is the group that helped us celebrate every birthday party, Sunday barbecue, and Jewish holiday. As the fifteen kids in the group ran around playing games and swimming in backyard pools, we heard the many different accents of our parents. The families came from Israel, South Africa, Cuba, Romania ... We enjoyed empanadas and falafel followed by dulce de leche cakes. The beauty of all the different cultures shaped all of the children in our group.

For me, immigrants have always been synonymous with love, kindness, family, hard-work, and dedication

to doing the very best for their children. The parents in our group had all sorts of jobs - engineer, architect, doctor, banker, psychologist, social worker, professor - but they all worked hard to make sure their children would have a happy childhood full of adventures. I feel so lucky that my siblings and I got to grow up with these people as our adopted extended family. To this day, we are all regularly in touch and so happy when we get to see one another.

And so, when I see the way that our country is currently treating immigrants I am heartbroken. To treat any human being in this way is devastating. It goes against everything Judaism teaches. The Torah is full of examples:

Love your fellow as yourself - Vayikra 19:18

When a stranger resides with you in your land, you shall not wrong him. The stranger who resides with you shall be to you as one of your citizens - Vayikra 19:33-34

You shall not wrong a stranger or oppress him, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt. - Shemot 22:20

We have an obligation as Jews, but also as human beings to speak out when we see wrong. And what is happening to immigrants in our country right now is wrong. As a mother, as a teacher, and as an immigrant, I dream of a better future for our children. I hope we can work together to make that dream a reality.






MITZVAH CORPS

HNT Building Enhancements

Let There Be Light

If you have ever sat in the back of the Sanctuary, you will have noticed reading the prayer books was difficult, and not just because you weren't paying attention. The old and deteriorating lights were so dim as to make reading nearly impossible. Due to the sloped high ceilings and being installed on a "hill", changing the lightbulbs was an impossible task.

As part of our HNT building upgrades this past year, a lighting consultant was brought in to provide some advice about how to address this issue without "breaking the bank" – we had been getting quotes of more than \$40,000 just to put up scaffolding for light installation. The consultant recommended a new LED product that has a 30-degree tilt feature to compensate for the sloped ceilings and could be installed for a reasonable price. Based on this recommendation, the lights were purchased.

Creating a way to address the height issues, based on his experience, our contractor was able to design a system of movable scaffolding and chair removal to do the installation at an affordable price. Installing the lights

section by section, the project was completed in a week without disrupting Shabbat services. Walking into the synagogue the following Shabbat, the change was undeniably obvious; no one had to be told about the new lights: they spoke for themselves!

And, as another benefit, these new LED lights ALSO consume only 10 watts of power compared to the old lights that consumed 250 watts – a big savings for our energy costs! Come "see" the brighter and more energy efficient HNT Sanctuary! And you no longer have to be afraid of the back rows!



A Safe, Imaginative New Playground

We're excited to share that our synagogue has installed a brand-new playground structure, replacing the old equipment that had become unsafe. The new Sunset Harbor Play System is a commercial-grade structure designed for years of safe, active, and imaginative play.

Built with durable materials and safety in mind, the playground features sturdy steel posts, high-quality slides, and multiple climbing options. Children can climb, explore, and race down wave and double slides, while ground-level elements like a drum and rain wheel encourage creative and cooperative play.

Designed for children ages 5-12, the structure accommodates up to 25 children and includes accessible features that meet ADA standards, along with current ASTM and CPSC safety guidelines. New wood-chip surfacing has also been added to improve cushioning and safety.

We're thrilled to offer this welcoming new space and look forward to the joy, laughter, and connection it will bring to our community.


